	Executive Director Rini thanked everyone for coming and introduced Board President Jacqueline Jeffery.
	President Jeffery thanked guests, and introduced the Senators and Representatives attending, including Senator Seth Lewis, Senator Suzy Glowiak Hilton, Representative Diane Blair-Sherlock, Representative Terra Costa-Howard, Representative Jennifer Sanalitro, Representative Marti Deuter, District Directors, Assistants to Legislators, and Legislative Aides.
	There were 23 Park Districts represented and two Special Recreation Associations represented. Two DuPage County Commissioners attended, as well as two Carol Stream Parks Foundation Board Members.
	Each Legislator had time to speak on topics including Open Space Lands Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) funding, and the importance of Parks and Recreation to the community.
	Carolyn Ubriaco, Commissioner at Elmhurst Park District and IPRA Legislative Committee Member spoke on the importance of working with local legislators.  Peter Murphy, IAPD Director, Jason Anselment, General Counsel, and Maura Freeman, Director of Advocacy and Strategic Initiatives all spoke to review the upcoming Spring Session and the IAPD Legislative Platform.

Listening Post	dy Poole from Winfield addressed the Board with concerns about the layout and location the playground renovations scheduled at Pleasant Hill Park. Mr. Poole's home backs up the park and new playground location. He is concerned about the noise from children aying, and while he appreciated the changes Executive Director already communicated, d that the relocation was at the request of the School District to improve supervision of e students, he still requests the Board consider moving the playground further away from a home. Board President Jeffery said a written response will be provided within 48 hours.

Action Item	A. Approval: Resolution No. 25-01 Recognizing Steve Ravanesi Commissioner Gramann read the resolution recognizing contributions Steve Ravanesi made to the Carol Stream Park District over the last 30 years.				



Commissioner Sokolowski made a motion to approve Resolution 25-01, a Resolution Honoring Steve Ravanesi for over 30 years of service to the Carol Stream Park District. Seconded by Commissioner Powers.

Voice Vote. All in favor. None Opposed. Motion Passes

Steve thanked the Board and credited his mother for allowing him to ride his bike everywhere starting when he was 11 years old; that gave him the idea to start the Bike Club. He recognized several members of the bike club that were present who were instrumental in helping it grow. He asked Larry Driscoll to take over organizing the rides when he decided to retire. Executive Director Rini reminded everyone that 100% of Bike Club memberships goes to the Carol Stream Parks Foundation.

#### **Discussion Items**

- A. Batting Cages at McCaslin Possible Future Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) item. Director Bachewicz said the Carol Stream Travel Softball Baseball Association (CSTSBA) proposed batting cages in 2022, but fundraising efforts fell short and the idea was tabled. Director Bachewicz said when Commissioner Parisi requested that this project be discussed again, she called the CSTSBA president, who said their financial situation would not make it possible for them to fund such a project, but they may be able to make small donations over time for batting cages. Commissioner Parisi thinks having batting cages at our flagship facility would allow us to increase revenue and would be a win for adult and youth players. Commissioner Gramann asked about the cost. Division Manager Kenny said a rough estimate would be \$40,000 for two cages, which does not include the cost of the base, any engineering, or installation. Netting should last 8-10 years; removing the nets off-season would extend their useful life. Commissioner Gramann said kids really need a place to warm up and adults would benefit too. She is in favor of adding this to our future CIP. Commissioner Bird asked about the base and Director Hamilton said there are some options that include either concrete or limestone under the turf. Commissioner Bird is not opposed to it, but if the CSTSBA made donations toward the batting cages, they will think they own it. Commissioner Sokolowski reminded the Board that the original plans for McCaslin included a pitching warm up area, but it was scrapped. He likes the idea but is concerned about the cost. Would we be able to recoup the costs with increased rental fees? Executive Director Rini explained that staff does not see this as a revenue generator, but rather an added amenity for a premier facility that does not have open space for warm up. Commissioner Jeffery said we should consider increasing fees for the tournaments. Commissioner Powers would consider it but prefers to charge people to use them. Commissioner Witteck added that anything we do to improve McCaslin would be beneficial. Commissioner Jeffery asked staff to get pricing and include it on our next CIP priority exercise.
- B. Weekly Happenings
  - Commissioner Sokolowski commended custodian Frank for fixing a problem in the men's locker room so quickly this morning.



- Commissioner Sokolowski noted that our liquor license was issued by the Village of Carol Stream. Commissioner Parisi asked what the advantages are over DuPage County. Director Bachewicz said the biggest benefit of being annexed into the Village is the police service. Director Hamilton said the permitting process is also much better under the Village. Commissioner Parisi asked if we can extend the hours liquor is sold at McCaslin. Director Bachewicz said the current rule to cut off liquor sales when the last game starts has worked for us so far, but we will review the policy.
- Commissioner Gramann commended staff for the successful Legislative
  Breakfast held last Friday. Executive Director Rini shared compliments from
  IAPD, and that for the second year, this event drew the most Legislators.
  Commissioner Sokolowski was happy to hear that the Open Space Lands
  Acquisition and Development (OSLAD) grant program should be available
  next year. Executive Director Rini commented that they are keeping OSLAD,
  and the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Grant in mind due to the
  upcoming closure of St. Luke Parish.
- Commissioner Witteck complimented front desk staff for the Bus Campaign Fundraising competition. She likes how staff ask people if they would like to make a donation.

B. Approval: Adopt Board Policy Manual

Executive Director Rini reviewed the changes made to the Board Policy Manual based on recommendations from IAPD. Commissioner Jeffery said the policy changes encompasses all the recommendations we discussed.

Commissioner Sokolowski made a motion to adopt the updated Board Policy

Manual to clarify the duties of the Commissioners and create the best opportunity for Board Members to successfully represent the residents of the Carol Stream Park District. Seconded by Commissioner Gramann.

Voice Vote. All in favor. None Opposed. Motion Passes

C. Approval: Ordinance No 586 Commissioner Absences

Executive Director Rini said this is a housekeeping item to repeal Ordinance No. 375 and approve Ordinance No. 586 to update the number of times a Commissioner may be absent from a Board Meeting. Commissioner Sokolowski asked about how we will handle absences if someone is sick. Executive Director Rini said the policy gives the Board flexibility by using the word "may" to use discretion before declaring a seat vacant.

Commissioner Powers made a motion to repeal Ordinance No. 375 and approve Ordinance No 586 to fix the length of time a Commissioner may be absent before the Board seat is declared vacant. Seconded by Commissioner Bird.

# Quarterly Treasurer's Report Fiscal Year Ending December 31, 2025 First Quarter

The following is the **Quarterly Treasurer's Report** for the Carol Stream Park District for the first quarter of fiscal year ending December 31, 2025.

Current Fund Balance Refer to Chart A

- The opening fund balances represent unaudited values.
- The ancillary funds (Paving, FICA, Audit, Liability, and IMRF) are charted as part of the Corporate Fund. The District is still required to 'levy' by fund, but will record and hold the dollars in one Corporate Fund.
- The First Quarter **Combined Fund Balance is \$5,551,847.** This includes all operating, restricted use funds, the balance of the bond proceeds, capital, and repair & replacement dollars.
  - The first quarter ending fund balance for all **Operating Funds is \$3,608,167.** This compares favorably to the 2024 first quarter ending balance of \$3,559,221. Operating funds include:

Corporate/Corporate R&R FICA
Recreation/Recreation R&R Audit
Paving & Lighting IMRF
Liability

- The Year-to-Date (YTD) change in the Operating Fund Balance from beginning balances reflects a decrease of \$819,710; this compares slightly less favorable to the first quarter decrease of \$1,290,865 in 2024 (\$790,865 without the \$500,000 transfer to Capital) and the decrease of \$689,367 in 2023.
  - First Quarter typically performs at a loss.
  - The difference is mostly due to \$26,848 in Recreation repair &replacement purchases completed in early 2025 compared to none in 2024.
- Total Capital Dollars available are \$168,685.

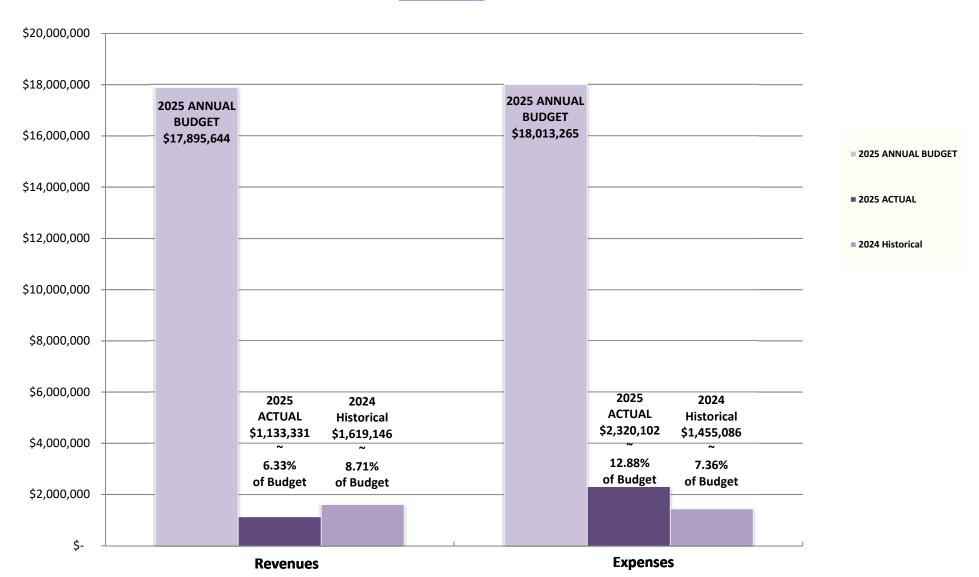

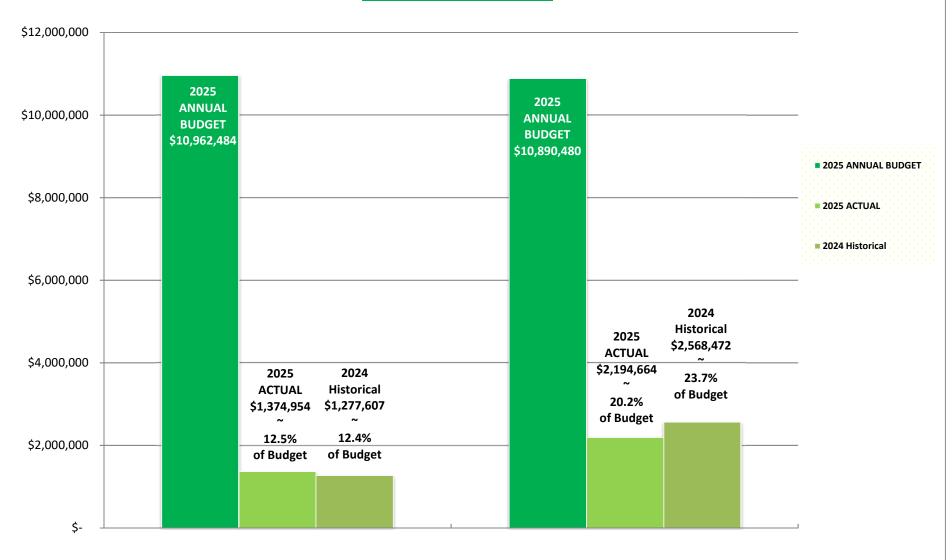


YTD Revenue & Expense as a % Budget

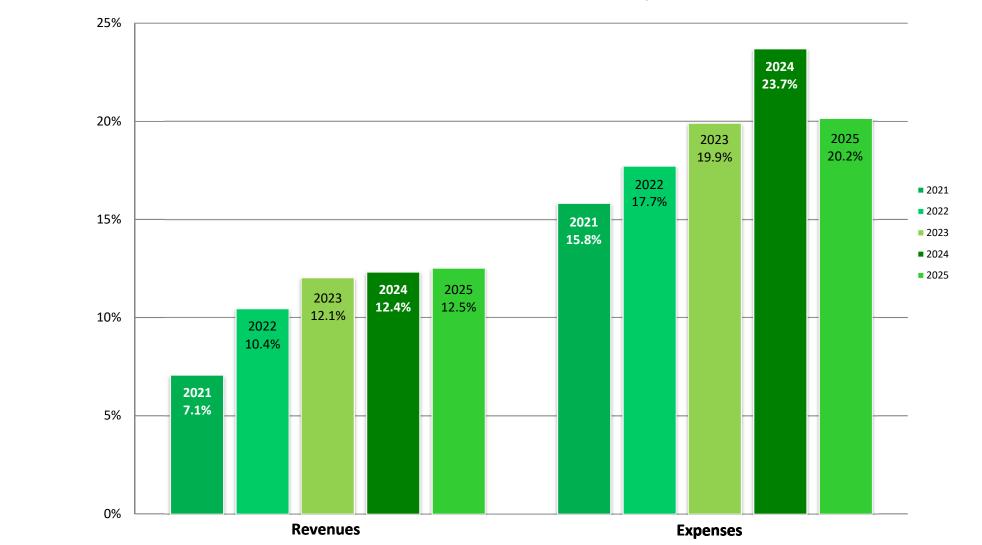

**OPERATING FUNDS - 5-Year History** 

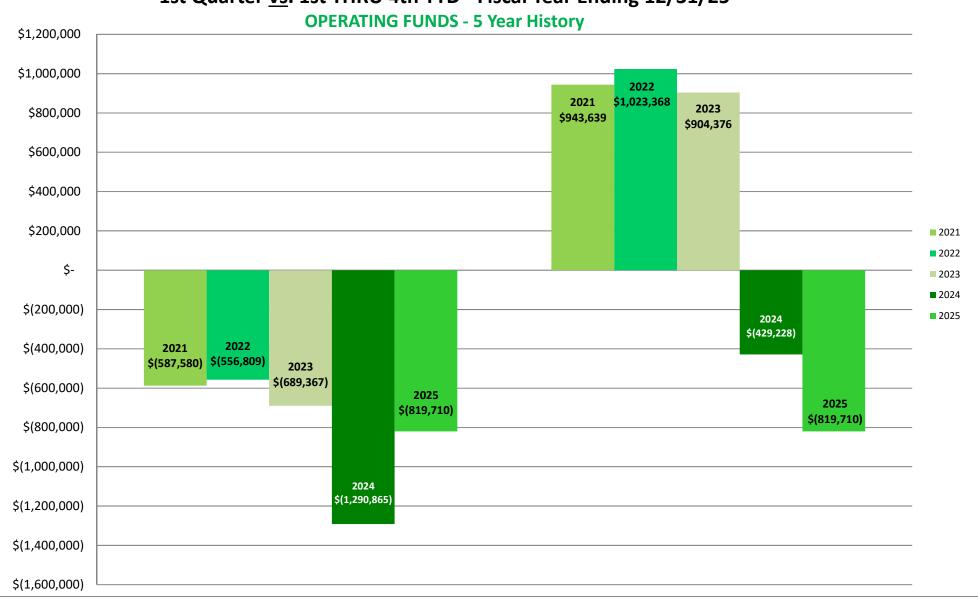

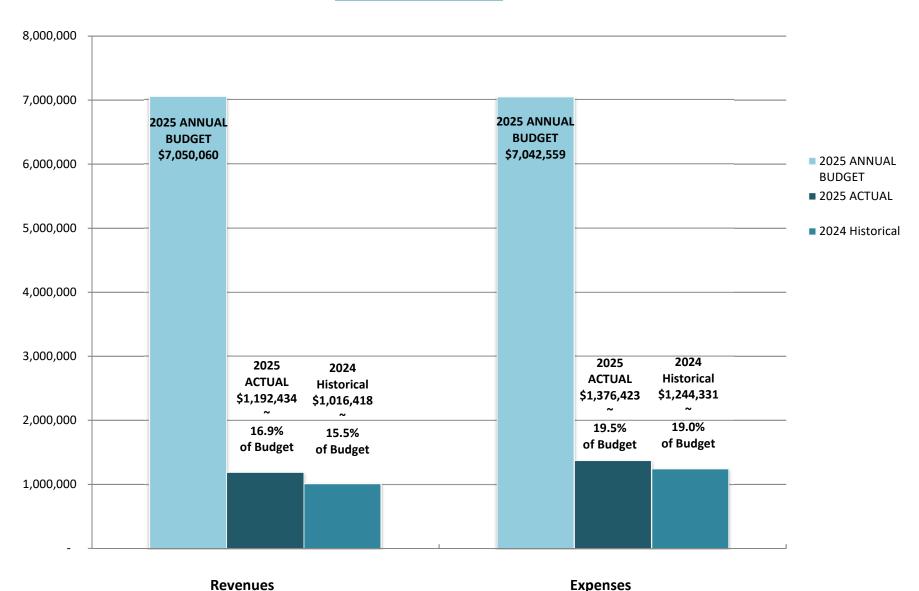


YTD Revenue & Expenses as a % of Budget

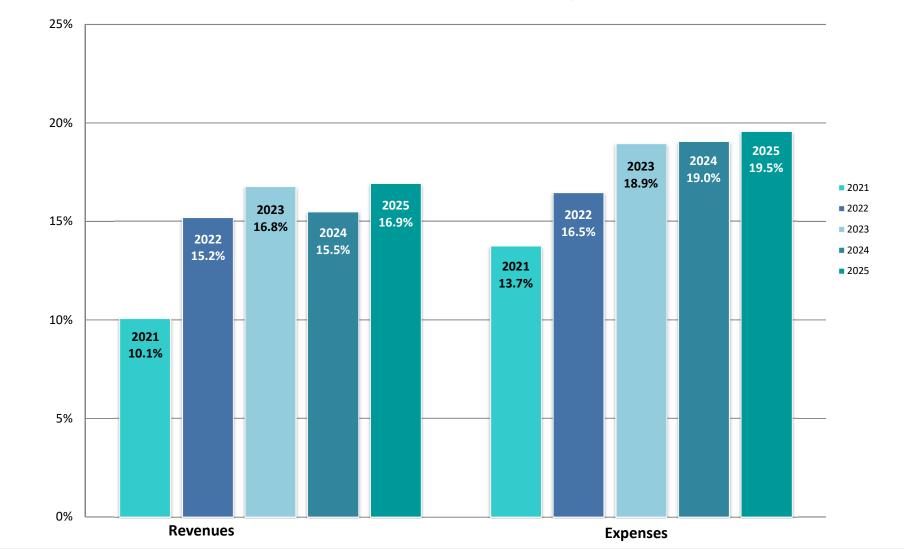

**RECREATION FUND - 5-Year History** 

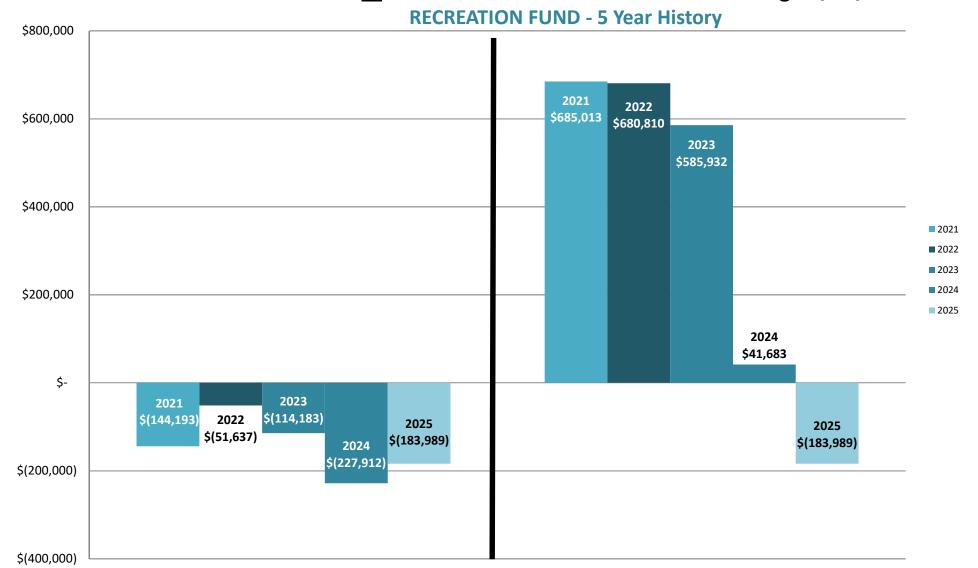

Discussion: Capital Improvement Plan -

First Quarter 2025 Agenda Item# 6A

The following is an updated Capital Improvement Plan for the First Quarter of 2025. Capital projects are separated into two main categories - Board's Priorities, and General Maintenance/Staff Suggestions/Repair & Replacement Needs.

The current Capital Improvement Plan is funded by earned revenue; this has been a long-time goal. As the Corporate and Recreation Funds reached their target balances, the Board gave authority for the first transfer of funds from the Corporate Fund to the Capital Fund. We will evaluate fund balances annually with the intention of making annual transfers to meet the bulk of our capital needs. Additionally, needs associated with paving/lighting for parking lots, pathways and trails will be primarily funded by the Paving & Lighting Tax Levy thereby removing most of the burden from the capital budget. Many capital projects are also supported by the Special Recreation Tax Levy which provides for the removal of barriers so that individuals with varying levels of ability may enjoy parks and recreation facilities and amenities. Staff will continue to seek additional funding for capital improvements through grants and alternative revenue sources.

The 2023 Community Needs Assessment provided strong support of the District from the Community. It reinforced the community's desire for the Park District to "take care of what we have" and continue to provide recreational opportunities and outdoor space. In November 2024 the Park Board took part in a new prioritization exercise which resulted in the following ranking:

- 1. Fitness Center Flooring/Carpet
- 2. Coral Cove Water Park Bucket Feature Painting
- 3. Armstrong Baseball Hub
- 4. SRC Locker Rooms
- 5. Evergreen Shoreline Stabilization
- 6. CCWP Bathroom/Locker Rooms
- 7. Armstrong Park Pickleball Enhancement

#### PRIORITY - Board Recommended

#### Priority 1 – Fountain View Recreation Center, Fitness Center Flooring

The hallway area to the Fitness Center locker rooms at Fountain View Recreation Center is a heavy traffic area that is starting to show its age, even with more frequent cleaning. Staff has recommended the carpeting be replaced. The most recent quote for updated flooring is \$108,000 for a vinyl type floor product, which is what staff recommends over carpet replacement. Vinyl is easier on feet and knees, is easier to clean and maintain, and has a longer life expectancy. We originally set an \$85,000 budget for this project and continue to seek quotes for a product that can fit both our budget and our needs. A DCEO Senate Initiative Grant of \$75,000 is also expected to offset the cost of this project. Project will be completed when grant funding is received.

#### **Priority 2 - Coral Cove Bucket Feature Painting**

After the Coral Cove Water Park renovation in 2022/2023, the water slides were re-surfaced and repainted, it became clear the bucket feature needed some attention. Mechanically the feature is in working condition, however, aesthetically the structure could use a refresh. Staff has obtained an updated quote for \$29,975 to repaint the entire structure this spring.

#### **Priority 3 - Armstrong Park Baseball Hub**

Armstrong Park continues to be a staple in the District for baseball/softball. Staff would like to make some aesthetic improvements to the facility including, but not limited to: field improvements, dugout improvements (concrete floor and adding roofs similar to McCaslin Park), and improving site amenities such as trash cans, reset existing pavers in the HUB and add ballfield mix to all fields. Staff is suggesting \$175,000. Scheduling for this work is currently pending.

#### Priority 4 – Simkus Recreation Center Locker Rooms

The Simkus Recreation Center bathrooms/locker rooms need renovation as they haven't been updated in quite some time. The District also has a dire need for storage at this facility; staff is exploring various concepts to renovate the bathrooms while creating needed storage space. Staff has obtained an estimate for \$55,000 for this improvement. Scheduling for this work is currently pending.

#### Priority 5 - Evergreen Shoreline Stabilization - Phase 1

Evergreen Lakes is owned by the Carol Stream Park District, but its primary purpose is for storm water management. It is connected via underground storm sewers to multiple other bodies of water in Carol Stream. Evergreen Lakes, in addition to the other bodies of water, are all managed by the Village of Carol Stream under the DuPage County Storm Water Commission. The lake's ancillary use is for recreational fishing and non-motorized boating. Because of the regular rise and fall of the water levels, shoreline erosion has occurred. The District initiated a native planting shoreline project several years ago which slows erosion and protects the shoreline through its deep rooting system. The restoration of the shoreline throughout both bodies of water at Evergreen Lakes will need to be addressed in the coming years. Staff contracted with WBK Engineering in 2024 to assess the shorelines of both bodies of water, place the areas of concern in order from most important to least important and provide approximate costs for each portion of shoreline restoration. This project will require substantial grant funding, and staff will work with Village engineers who have experience in that type of grant availability. The study has been completed with a total cost of \$1,600,000 in its entirety with Priority 1 areas totaling \$433,000. Funding has yet to be secured for this improvement.

#### Priority 6 – Coral Cove Water Park – Family Bathroom/Locker Room Renovations

The pool renovation in 2022/2023 improved function but did not enhance a majority of the aesthetics throughout the water park. This renovation would focus on the family bathrooms (flooring, lighting, fixtures) and both locker rooms for our patrons. Renovations would include: flooring, lighting, fixtures, partitions, lockers and locker configuration. Funding has yet to be secured for this improvement until an estimate is determined. Scheduling for this work is currently pending.

#### **Priority 7 - Armstrong Park Pickleball Enhancement**

With the continued success of the pickleball courts at Armstrong Park, there is a need for a practice court to be placed in the open center area. The practice court would not have a net as requested by multiple regular pickleball players, however, it will be lined on the existing surface. Additionally, some form of shade and seating remains a goal. Staff suggests \$55,000 for this improvement. Scheduling for this work is currently pending.

#### **Continuous Priority - Playground Replacement**

#### Parks & Playgrounds:

All District playgrounds are inspected and evaluated regularly; recommendations for replacement are based on 'actual' condition. The District uses the 2020 Park Analysis Plan to guide replacement needs of its playgrounds.

The Plan includes suggested improvements and enhancements as well as estimated costs. As time passes, the District applies a cost of living increase to those cost estimates for budget purposes. The plan includes many suggestions that can be considered 'a la carte' amenities – in other words, the actual playground replacement plan will be adjusted based on capital funds available, grant opportunities, and special recreation funds. The plan creates a comprehensive roadmap for the District replacement needs with a goal of replacing one playground per year. Staff is working on securing funding for playgrounds beyond 2025.

Pleasant Hill Park is being added ahead of Appomattox Park to allow the District to work jointly with Community Consolidated School District 200 (CUSD200) on the renovation through an OSLAD Grant. The \$600,000 grant was awarded in December 2024. The current project estimate is \$1,243,200 allin, to be funded by the \$600,000 OSLAD grant, a \$250,000 donation by CUSD200, \$90,000 by the Paving & Lighting fund, and \$303,200 by CIP, Cash-in-Lieu and Special Recreation funding. Expenses now encumbered are the final design contract with Hitchcock Design Group at \$119,000, with added reimbursables not to exceed \$2,500, Regional Land Services' topographic survey for \$5,400 and Testing Service Company's geotechnical engineering services for \$6,000.

**Appomattox Park** was the next playground renovation scheduled, but will be moved to 2026 (See Pleasant Hill Park). A contract for \$18,500 is in place for landscape architecture and design, civil engineering, cost estimate, permitting, bidding and construction. This small park is not a candidate for an OSLAD grant, and staff has budgeted an all-in amount of \$196,000 for the project. Up to 25% of the overall cost can be funded through the Special Recreation, and a new development at Fair Oaks/Lies could contribute \$50,000 in Cash-in-Lieu funding by the time we renovate this playground.

#### **Special Priority - 39 Passenger Bus**

The District currently owes a 39 passenger bus with a handicapped lift. Originally purchased in 2012, the bus has provided transportation for the Senior/Adult Trips, the youth summer camp program, and even served as emergency transportation in cooperation with the local Fire Protection District. Now at the end of it's useful life, replacement of this vehicle will cost \$250,000. As a unique benefit that serves both our youth, adult, and senior populations, the Carol Stream Parks Foundation plans to take on a fundraising effort to help purchase a new bus. The District's 501(c)3 is hoping to raise \$100,000. The replacement bus will also be outfitted with a wheelchair lift to ensure accessibility for individuals with physical restrictions. With this accomodation, up to 50% of the cost can be covered by the Special Recreation Tax Levy. Because of the limits of the Special Recreation Fund, the District must accumulate those taxes over the next few years. We will also trade-in the old vehicle to offset part of the cost. Capital funds will pay for whatever is left; we have earmarked \$50,000 at this time.

#### Other Repair & Replacement Plans ~ Staff Recommendations

#### Paths/Trails/Parking Lots/Lighting

Pathways/Trails ranked as the most popular park district provided amenity during the 2023 Community Needs Assessment. The same has been true for the past several Community Assessments making funding very important. The Park District annually levies taxes for the purposes of Paving and Lighting improvements. Our extensive trail system and multiple public parking lots require several years to accumulate funding to support our needs, therefore grant funding will be an important supplement to meet the repair and replacement plan for this category.

We budgeted to share the cost of a **pathway improvement near Spring Trails Elementary School**; we will only address the section of pathway on our property. We have budgeted \$55,000 for this project. After recent staffing changes at U-46, we are attempting to revisit this project with new staff.

We have earmarked \$30,000 for the much-needed resealing/restriping of Armstrong Parking Lot for 2026.

Future funding of Paths/Trails/Parking Lots/Lighting will be done through the Paving & Lighting Tax Levy and grant funding; therefore, projects will be shown here for information only. We will continue to prioritize projects based on need.

#### **Evergreen Gymnasium**

In accordance with the intergovernmental agreement with Benjamin School District 25, the District shares costs to repair and maintain Evergreen Gymnasium and accompanying shared space.

District 25 has **replaced the flooring in the shared gymnasium** in 2024-2025. The final bid for the floor was \$119,500, making the District's cost \$59,750. While this project came in well under budget, there has been a new issue with the masonry work on the outside of the gym building. The final masonry repair costs came in at \$59,750; our share of the cost was \$28,375. These two combined repairs are \$88,125 which is slightly above what we originally budgeted for the flooring only. Work was completed over the 2024 summer and winter breaks. District 25 is also planning to replace all gym doors in 2025 for \$70,070.52; the District's cost will be \$35,035.26 to be budgeted for 2026.

#### **Vehicles and Capital Equipment**

The **Fleet Replacement Schedule** is reviewed annually. When practical, replacements are deferred until necessary. Plans are also affected by the State's release of public bid values for fleet vehicles. The program saves significant money and typically justifies delaying purchase unless it becomes an emergency situation. The latest fleet replacement plan is listed below and <u>does not account for any savings brought about through trade-in value</u> of current equipment/vehicles:

Now on the list for purchase in 2025/2026 is a bunker rake and a small gator. For 2027/2028, replacements of two 2012 pickup trucks for two F250 pickup trucks will take place. Vehicle purchases are ranked lower on the priority list, and therefore purchases will be based on condition and availability of funding.

#### 2025 Emergency Repair/Other Projects

With the annexation of Coyote Crossing Minigolf, the District is moving to city water/sewer. As such, we have incurred engineering by Jacob & Hefner Associates for \$26,150 and construction by IHC Construction Company for \$24,900 to bring water into the facility. The total project cost is \$51,050 and has a May 1 deadline. The SRC Gym Floor repair was completed for \$63,605. Fountain View Pool repairs have started on the filters with a project cost of \$26,781.

#### Summary

The Capital Improvement Plan is fluid and will adjust to accommodate the unexpected; project budgets may need to be reduced, increased, or put on hold.

This updated Plan now shows how we will spend our new Capital Improvement Fund dollars, sourced from Operational Fund transfers, allowing us to 'taking care of what we have.'

Based on the values/estimates above, and assuming awarded grants/donations are received, there is a current funding shortfall of (\$79,410) for projects and vehicles <u>through 2028</u>. Projects for 2025 are currently fully funded.

Our future funding plans\* will drive how and when we can accomplish any unfunded projects. We frequently review year end projections in order to anticipate future funding, which will allow us to schedule CIP projects each year.

#### \*Funding Plans include:

- Seek grant opportunities and other alternative revenue resources.
- Use unbudgeted earnings on investments (at year end).
- Use unbudgeted Personal Property Replacement Taxes (at year end).
- Make transfers from Operating Funds whose balances are over target balances (at year end).
- Work with the Carol Stream Parks Foundation on funding campaigns for various CIP Projects.

#### Issue:

Should the Board approve the updates to the Administrative Operations Policy Manual related to the service and sale of alcohol as outlined in the supporting documents referenced as Exhibit A and Exhibit B.

#### **Background/Reasoning**

In 2016, the Park Board of Commissioners authorized the sale of alcohol at McCaslin Park through our concessions operation. At the same time, they authorized renters the option to purchase and serve alcohol during private events. To support that authorization, Park Districts Rules and Regulations which are outlined in Ordinance 411 was updated, and language was added to the Administrative Operations Manual.

With the recent annexation of McCaslin Park into the Village of Carol Stream, the District's sale and service of alcohol must now follow Village guidelines. Language within Ordinance 411 – the authority to serve and sell alcohol – is still accurate. The guidelines for 'how' to serve and sell alcohol are outlined in the Administrative Operations Manual and must be updated. In addition to aligning with Village of Carol Stream Liquor License requirements, language has been updated to more accurately align with current operations and ensure a smoother flow of information for that section of the manual.

The updates include the Village of Carol Stream local ordinances, and the latest State of Illinois requirements. Additionally, <u>Section 29 - Alcohol</u>, has been introduced to distinguish between alcohol provided by renters in buildings and alcohol sold by staff at McCaslin Park.

#### **Public/Customer Impact:**

Maintaining an up-to-date Administrative Operations Policy Manual that aligns with current practices and local ordinances provides clear guidance for staff regarding alcohol sales and rentals.

#### Recommendation (Roll Call)

That the Board approve the updates to the Administrative Operations Policy Manual related to the service and sale of alcohol as outlined in the supporting documents referenced as Exhibit A and Exhibit B.

#### 28.0 Field, Facility and Picnic Permit System

The Board of Commissioners recognizes the necessity of providing district residents the opportunity for maximum utilization of district owned or managed parks and facilities in a manner that is fair and equitable to all participants.

Resident individuals, affiliated groups, corporations, and non-profits shall have priority over non-resident individuals, groups, corporations, and non-profits.

#### 28.1 Deposits

Deposits may be required from all groups using any of the park district fields and/or facilities. Groups will be charged for any damages, loss of keys or passes and time spent for clean up by park district staff (if required). These charges will be deducted from the group's deposit. The park district reserves the right to make adjustments in these fees as necessary. Damages over and above the deposit fee will be charged to the group and / or contact person named on the permit application form.

#### 28.2 Certificate of Insurance

Certificates of Insurance may be required from all organizations, businesses, corporations and affiliated groups prior to being issued a permit. All certificates must be site specific, date specific, with the Carol Stream Park District named as additional insured.

#### 28.3 29.0 Alcohol Request to have Alcohol on Park District Property

Park District Ordinance 411 allows alcohol to be consumed at McCaslin Park, Fountain View Recreation Center and Simkus Recreation Center only by permit as long as the following criteria is met.

#### 29.1 Request to have Alcohol on Park District Property

Fountain View Recreation Center and Simkus Recreation Center renters may only have alcohol by permit as long as the following criteria is met:

#### General Provisions for all permitted authorization of alcohol consumption:

- Event is either a private rental or District-sponsored event; the program shall not be primarily dedicated to children. The Park District will have the sole authority in judging the status of an event, program and rental.
- Alcoholic beverages must be consumed in designated areas only.
- No one under 21 is allowed to serve or consume alcohol.
- Depending on the location of the event and the type of alcohol being served, the Park District may require that it be served in non-breakable cups or bottles.
- Private security may be required at the discretion of Park District and the cost shall be paid by the renter.

- Alcohol may not be served at any event or program involving swimming, boating or any in-the-water or on-the-water activities.
- Park District will set hours and controls for all rental, events and programs for which consumption of alcohol has been permitted.
- All requests for the consumption of alcohol will require approval by two (2) members of the Administration staff, including at least one Division Manager level or above and the Rentals Supervisor. Director.
- The permitting of alcohol is strictly discretionary and may be denied, discontinued or altered at any time, for any reason, or no reason whatsoever be it to one renter, or to all renters by vote of the Board of Commissioners of the Park District. Park District may refuse applicant for any reason at any time.
- Intervention procedures will be implemented and followed when a patron is suspected of being intoxicated.
- The following intervention procedures will be followed when a patron is suspected of being intoxicated:
  - The district's rental host will inform the renter and server of alcohol if a Guest appears to be intoxicated.
  - The rental host should never accuse guests of being drunk.
     Expressing concern is a good way to achieve empathy with a guest.
     He or she is more likely to feel that you really care about his or her welfare and safety.
  - Remain patient and calm.
  - If an intoxicated guest becomes verbally abusive or hostile and/or physical violence seems likely or occurs, immediately take the following steps:
    - Call the police and tell the renter that you have done so.
    - Try to separate the intoxicated guest from other guests.
    - Speak firmly and calmly. Repeat yourself as often as necessary to make the guest understand you.
    - Negotiate with the guest not to leave the establishment and to calmly wait for police to arrive.
    - Never touch or try to physically restrain an intoxicated guest.

**Limited Permit for Renter provided alcohol** - Available only at Fountain View Recreation Center and Simkus Recreation Center. Alcohol may be served by patrons renting space under the following conditions:

- Renters must purchase liquor liability insurance thru PDRMA and provide the Park District with a certificate of insurance naming the Park District as an additional insured.
- The selling of alcohol is strictly prohibited.
- Alcohol consumption is limited to the physical space of the room being rented and will not be allowed outside of that area.
- For rentals with over 96 attendees, 2 Park District staff members will be scheduled on site.

- Beer, wine, champagne, wine coolers and malt beverages, only. No hard liquor. No Kegs.
- Park District staff ages 21 and older will be physically present inside the space being rented during any rentals involving alcohol and will be BASSET (Beverage Alcohol Sellers and Servers Education and Training) trained and certified. Since the Village of Carol Stream does not accept BASSET training completed via an online class, all employees will undergo BASSET training thru a course provided by the Village of Carol Stream or other entity.
- Generally, beverages may be served in cups or bottles. Depending on the location of the event and the type of alcohol being served, the Park District may require that it be served in non-breakable cups or bottles.

#### 29.0 29.2 Park District Staff Sale of Alcohol on Park District Property

Park District Ordinance 411 also allows alcohol to be sold on park property by District staff members as dictated by Park Policy. Park District Ordinance 411 allows alcohol to be sold at McCaslin Park by the District's concessions operation see 28.4.

That policy is as follows:

Staff members of the Park District may sell alcoholic beverages on Park District property. The time and location of the sale shall be determined by staff who shall inform the Board of Commissioners of the said time and location not less than one month prior to such sale. The type of beverage and the amount charged shall also be determined by staff.

# General Provisions for all permitted authorization of alcohol consumption: Furthermore:

- The event, park program or general use of the park property at the time of the sale shall not be primarily dedicated to children.

- A Park District employee who is at least 21 years of age and BASSET trained will be present at all times when alcohol is being sold.

- No one under age 21 18 may serve alcohol.
- Depending on the location of the event and the type of alcohol being served, the Park District may require that it be served in non-breakable cups or bottles.
- Alcohol may not be served at any event or program involving swimming, boating or any inthe-water or on-the-water activities.
- Park District will set hours and controls for all for which consumption of alcohol has been permitted.
- All 21+ employees will undergo BASSET training thru a course provided by the Village of Carol Stream or other entity.
- The proper liquor licenses must be secured and liquor liability insurance in place in order to sell alcohol.

#### 29.1 29.3 Park District Staff Alcohol Serving Policy and Procedures

The following policy is to help staff responsibility serve alcoholic beverages at McCaslin Park as part of the total experience you provide to our guests.

#### State of Illinois Requirements (235 IL CS 5/) Liquor Control Act of 1934

- Post license. Frame and hang the liquor license in plain view in a conspicuous location on the licensed premises.
- Clean and sanitize beer taps.
- Display the alcohol pregnancy warning sign properly.
- Post the Proof of Age sign.
- Adhere to pre-mix alcohol beverage requirements.
- Law prohibits anyone under the age of 21 to be served.
- Beverage Alcohol Sellers and Servers Education and Training (BASSET) required for all alcohol servers in Illinois.

#### **ID/Carding Practices**

It is illegal to serve alcohol to minors and intoxicated individuals. The Carol Stream Park District has the right to protect its guests, establishment and staff. There is no penalty for refusing alcohol to someone you suspect is a minor or intoxicated. Anyone wishing to purchase alcohol must show a valid picture ID.

- The following are acceptable forms of ID: driver's license, state ID card, military ID, or a current passport. Tickets or vertical ID's will not be accepted in lieu of acceptable forms of ID.
- Have the individual take the ID out of the wallet or purse and hand it to you. If the license is not valid, turn it over to verify if a renewal sticker is in place.
- Check the out-of-state IDs with an ID Checking Guide, which is available in the concession stand.
- Parents cannot offer alcohol to their minor children.
- If the seller/server is not comfortable in verifying an individual's age, he may require the individual to sign the Age of Identity Form or exercise the right to refuse service. (Refer to Appendix 1 for a sample form).
- Once the legal age has been verified, staff will provide a wristband to the patron to wear in order to verify their age has been verified for further purchases. Patrons without wristbands will need to have their ID checked with each purchase.

#### **Prevention Practices/Techniques**

#### **Requirements of Sales:**

- Patrons will be limited to a maximum of 2 alcoholic beverages per purchase.
- The sale of alcohol will conclude at the start of the last regular scheduled game of the day.
- The sale of "doubles" or "triples" is prohibited.
- The sale of drinks in rounds is prohibited.
- All drinks are to be sold individually, not in pitchers.
- Encourage food consumption and non-alcoholic beverages will be sold at all times.
- Prohibit customers from leaving premises with drinks.
- Do not allow an intoxicated individual to drive from the establishment. Arrange a ride (call a cab ride share, a sober friend, or a family member, etc.). If the individual does drive away, call the police!
- The telephone numbers of <del>local cab companies</del> ride shares will be available for staff.
- No alcohol may be brought on or off the premises.
- No "last call" offered.
- Staff is prohibited from serving to adults who give minors alcoholic beverages.
- Staff is prohibited from selling/serving intoxicated or under age patrons.
- Management is prohibited from ordering sellers/servers to provide alcoholic beverages to intoxicated patrons.
- Violations of beverage service policies will result in disciplinary action up to and including termination.

Servers will receive training in responsible beverage service practices and policies. All 21+ Concessions staff will be BASSET trained.

• Staff will follow intervention procedures when necessary.

#### **Intervention Procedures**

- Management should support seller/servers' intervention efforts and have the seller/server notify management as soon as s/he identifies a problem.
- Never accuse guests of being drunk. Expressing concern is a good way to achieve empathy with a guest, as he is more likely to feel you really care about his welfare and safety. Never tell a customer "You can't have a drink." Instead say "Our policy doesn't allow me to serve you more alcohol." Ask if you can serve them a non-alcoholic beverage. If necessary, contact your supervisor.
- Never change your mind after discontinuing service. This tells the guest he can bargain for "just one more."
- Remain patient and calm. Simply and clearly repeat the decision to discontinue alcohol service as often as necessary.

- If an intoxicated guest becomes verbally abusive or hostile, and/or physical violence seem likely to occur, immediately take the following steps:
  - Call the police and contact a manager. Do not assume the situation will resolve itself.
  - o Try to separate the intoxicated guest from other guests.
  - Speak firmly and calmly. Repeat yourself as often as necessary to make the guest understand you.
  - Negotiate with the guest not to leave the establishment and to wait calmly for the police to arrive.
  - Never touch or try to restrain an intoxicated guest physically.

# **Training Staff**

Staff will receive annual training on the following items:

- All staff will be required to complete a state approved BASSET Training course in order to serve alcohol.
- Happy hour laws.
- Checking IDs/proper identification allowed.
- Overview of prevention/intoxication procedures.
- Non-alcoholic alternatives.
- Alcohol limits per sale.
- Terminating-service procedures.
- Safe-ride procedures.
- Designated driver program.

# **Sign Requirements**

All warning signs will be posted at within the Concession Stand.

- Warning to minors.
- Government warning.
- Specific rules.

# **Promote Responsible Drinking**

The District will display special signs throughout the event to encourage responsible drinking and reinforce the "Think When You Drink" theme. The District will promote safe ride home and designated driver programs. The phone numbers of local cab companies will be available within the concession stand.

#### **Alcohol Sales**

Patrons may only purchase 2 alcoholic drinks at one time. The sale of alcohol will conclude at the start of the last regular scheduled game of the day.

# No Outside Alcohol Beverages at McCaslin Park

Patrons will be prohibited from bringing their own alcoholic beverages on to Park District property. This includes the parking lots. The District will utilize a contractual vendor to provide additional security services when deemed necessary. For all large tournaments held on site to help identify potential disturbances as early as possible and to serve as a deterrent for potential incidents; identify intoxicated partygoers or those who show symptoms of medical problems and any other problems.

# **Age Identity Form**

The Age Identity Form is a tool for retailers to use if they are unsure whether or not a prospective customer is of legal age to purchase and consume alcohol.

Retailers who have checked the identification and compared the identification to the person presenting it and are still unsure whether the person is of age, for whatever reason, may request the person to complete the form.

The practical result of this is that a person who is using another's identification, or has some form of illegal identification, may stop short of signing the form. If the person refuses to complete and sign the form, you should turn away the person. It may be that any number of persons, when asked to complete and sign the form, will simply turn and walk away.

If the person signs the form and is actually under legal age, the person committed a Class A misdemeanor (fine up to \$2,500 and up to a year in jail) under 235 5/10-1(e).

The form is not a "get out of jail" card but the District may use it as evidence of positive attempts to avoid service and sale of alcohol to a person not of legal age. Please refer to Addendum C for a Sample Age and Identify Verification Form.

# 28.0 Field, Facility and Picnic Permit System

The Board of Commissioners recognizes the necessity of providing district residents the opportunity for maximum utilization of district owned or managed parks and facilities in a manner that is fair and equitable to all participants.

Resident individuals, affiliated groups, corporations, and non-profits shall have priority over non-resident individuals, groups, corporations, and non-profits.

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# 28.2 Certificate of Insurance

Certificates of Insurance may be required from all organizations, businesses, corporations and affiliated groups prior to being issued a permit. All certificates must be site specific, date specific, with the Carol Stream Park District named as additional insured.

# 29.0 Alcohol Request to have Alcohol on Park District Property

Park District Ordinance 411 allows alcohol to be consumed at McCaslin Park, Fountain View Recreation Center and Simkus Recreation Center only by permit as long as the following criteria is met:

# 29.1 Request to have Alcohol on Park District Property

Fountain View Recreation Center and Simkus Recreation Center renters may only have alcohol by permit as long as the following criteria is met:

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- Alcoholic beverages must be consumed in designated areas only.
- No one under 21 is allowed to serve or consume alcohol.
- Depending on the location of the event and the type of alcohol being served, the Park District may require that it be served in non-breakable cups or bottles.
- Private security may be required at the discretion of Park District and the cost shall be paid by the renter.
- Alcohol may not be served at any event or program involving swimming, boating or any in-the-water or on-the-water activities.

- Park District will set hours and controls for all rental, events and programs for which consumption of alcohol has been permitted.
- All requests for the consumption of alcohol will require approval by two (2)
  members of the Administration staff, including at least one Division Manager
  level or above and the Rentals Supervisor.
- The permitting of alcohol is strictly discretionary and may be denied, discontinued or altered at any time, for any reason, or no reason whatsoever be it to one renter, or to all renters by vote of the Board of Commissioners of the Park District. Park District may refuse applicant for any reason at any time
- Intervention procedures will be implemented and followed when a patron is suspected of being intoxicated.

**Limited Permit for Renter provided alcohol** - Available only at Fountain View Recreation Center and Simkus Recreation Center. Alcohol may be served by patrons renting space under the following conditions:

- Renters must purchase liquor liability insurance thru PDRMA and provide the Park District with a certificate of insurance naming the Park District as an additional insured.
- The selling of alcohol is strictly prohibited.
- Alcohol consumption is limited to the physical space of the room being rented and will not be allowed outside of that area.
- For rentals with over 96 attendees, 2 Park District staff members will be scheduled on site.
- Beer, wine, champagne, wine coolers and malt beverages, only. No hard liquor. No Kegs.

### ORDINANCE NO. 587

# AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE CAROL STREAM PARK DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Carol Stream Park District ("**Park District**") is an Illinois park district organized and operating pursuant to the Park District Code ("**Code**"), 720 ILCS 1205/1-1 *et seq.*;

WHEREAS, Section 3-9 of the Code, 720 ILCS 1205/3-9, authorizes park districts to annex territory containing 80 acres or less that is not incorporated within a park district, and is that is wholly bounded by one or more park districts and an arterial street; and

WHEREAS, the Carol Stream Park District Board of Commissioners desires to annex 4N210 Old Gary Avenue, Hanover Park, Illinois 60133 (the "**Territory**"), which is legal described in **Exhibit A**, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3-9 of the Code, on March 4, 2025, the Park District published a notice not more than 45 nor less than 30 days before the passage of this Ordinance, in the Daily Herald, which is a newspaper with a general circulation within the Park District, which notice stated that the Park District would contemplate the annexation of the Territory described in the notice at its April 14, 2025 Park District Board of Commissioners regular board meeting;

WHEREAS, said Territory contains 80 acres or less that is not incorporated within a park district, and is that is wholly bounded by one or more park districts and an arterial street;

WHEREAS, the Carol Stream Park District Board of Commissioners hereby finds and determines that it to be in the best interests of the Carol Stream Park District and its residents to annex the Territory.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Commissioners of the Carol Stream Park District, DuPage County, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1: That the Territory, legally described in Exhibit A, attached hereto, is hereby annexed to the Carol Stream Park District.

SECTION 2: That the Secretary of the Carol Stream Park District is hereby directed to record and file in the offices of the DuPage County Clerk and the DuPage County Recorder's Office, Wheaton, Illinois, being the County in which the Territory is situated, a certified copy of this Ordinance, together with an accurate map of the Territory hereby annexed, said map being attached hereto and made a part hereof, and labelled as **Exhibit B**, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

SECTION 3: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval and when a certified copy thereof, together with an accurate map is filed with the DuPage County Clerk and the DuPage County Recorder's Office; and thereupon, said Territory shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the Carol Stream Park District.

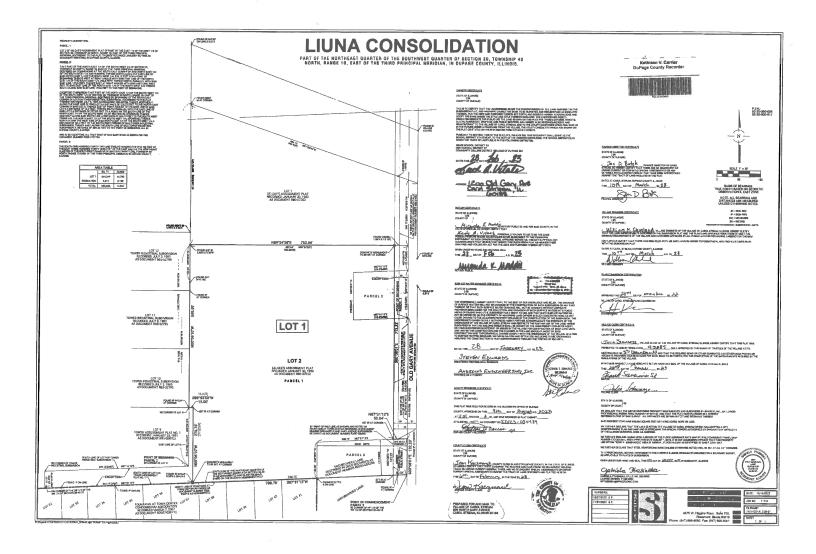

## Issue

Should the Board increase the Executive Director's authority to purchase playground equipment for Pleasant Hill Park from \$150,000 to an amount not to exceed \$180,000.

# Background/Reasoning

On February 24, 2025 the Board granted authority to the Executive Director to purchase a playground for Pleasant Hill Park in an amount not to exceed \$150,000. As updated engineering and cost estimates have been collected, the overall project cost is approximately \$90,000 under the it's \$1.2M budget. The lower the cost of the project, the lower our OSLAD matching amount will be.

In order to capture the most value from grant matching funds, accommodate the largest number of students on the playground at one time, and address the input received during community input sessions, we requested Hitchcock to upgrade the playground equipment and add several ground level play panels. The additional \$30,000 equipment plan is attached; the total playground price tag will be capped \$180,000. This will still allow for approximately \$60,000 in contingency should there be any unexpected issues to address.

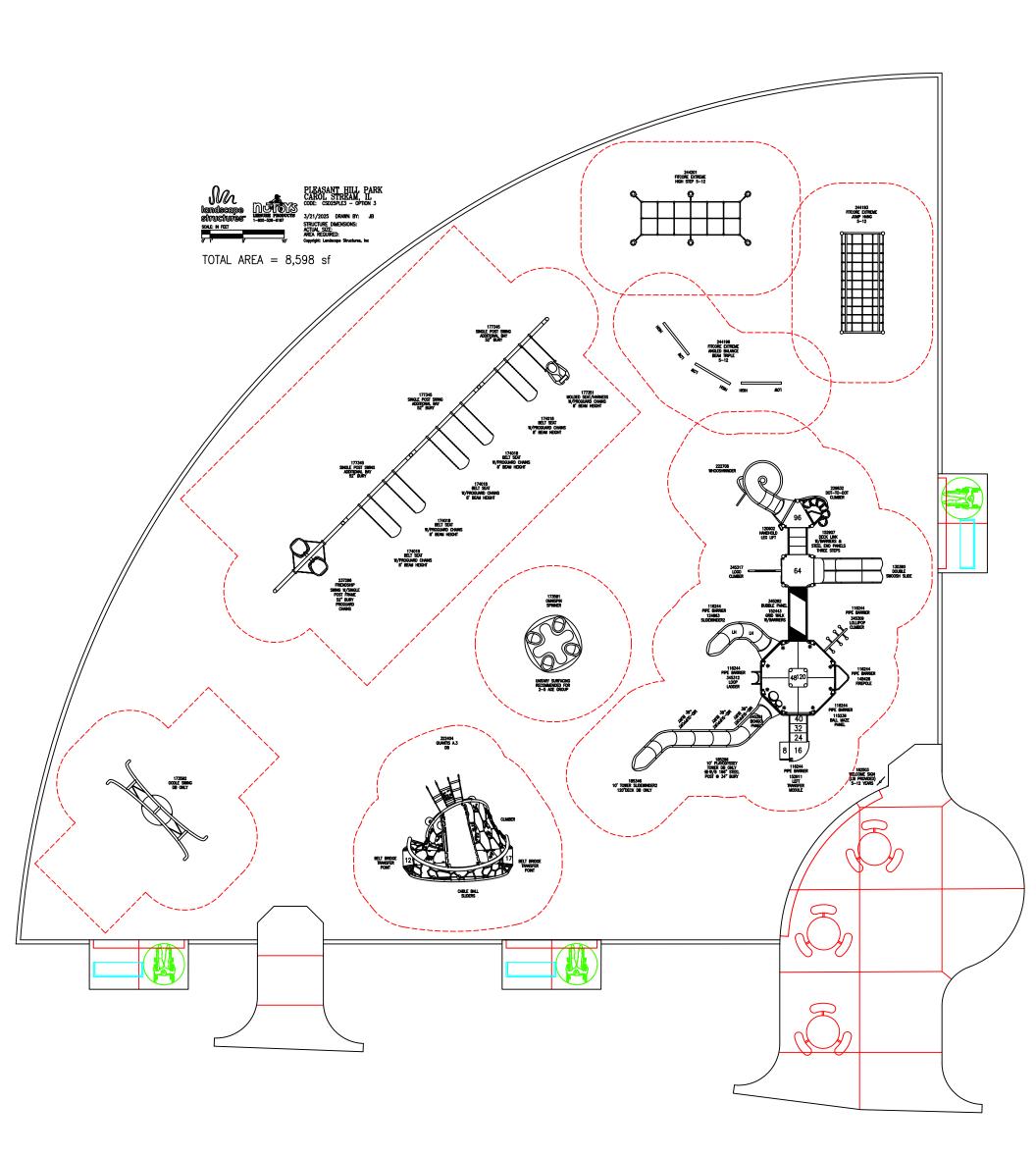
