Finance Committee Meeting Minutes

December 8, 2025

5:00 – 5:59 pm

Present: Commissioners Jeffery, Bird, Powers, and Becker. Commissioner Witteck arrived at 5:06. Commissioner Pauling arrived at 5:46.
Staff: Executive Director Rini, Directors Bachewicz, Quinn, and Scumaci, Superintendent Adamson, Finance Supervisor Nge, and Executive Assistant Greninger

Topic: Presentation of the Proposed 2026 Budget

Director Scumaci presented the budget for fiscal year 2026. During this meeting, we provided an overview of the proposed budget. Each Director highlighted key areas. At the January 12, 2026 meeting, we will request the Board's formal approval of the 2026 Budget and Appropriation Ordinance, 2026 Goals, the 2026 Organizational Chart, and 2026 Full-Time and Part-Time Wage Scales.

Commissioner Becker recalled approving the Gas and Electric Contracts recently. Have we explored using alternate energy sources, like solar? Executive Director Rini said we did explore this option two years ago. The return on investment is insufficient. We only have one building with the type of roof that would support the solar panels, which would not make a big enough impact to make it worthwhile.

Commissioner Jeffery noted that exploring the use and applications for AI technology is on the list for Organizational Goals. Director Scumaci said we are cautious, especially as it pertains to security. PDRMA is reviewing Tracker AI, which uses cell phone signals to track where people come from before attending events at the park district and where they go afterwards. It could lead to additional business sponsorships.

Commissioner Bird asked what percentage of EAV is expected for new growth. Director Scumaci estimates \$9 million, which is much higher than recent years.

There being no further questions, the committee meeting was adjourned at 5:59 pm.

The base aggregate does not include the Bond and Interest Fund. • As is the case every year, this is higher than the expected final increase. The District must overestimate in order to capture all the “new growth” EAV. • The actual expected aggregate increase is only 5.60% higher than last year. This is due to the new growth being added to the District, reassessment of current homes at an estimated average of 9.21%, as well as the CPI of 2.9%. • In April the final extension numbers will arrive and the District has five working days to make any adjustments to the equally allocated levy reduction, if one occurs. Carol Stream Parks Foundation Update Executive Director Rini provided an update on the Foundation, including the recent passing of Foundation member Dana Hybl in November. Her contributions to the Foundation included getting a small playground donated for Armstrong Park near the Pickleball Courts, a bench in front of Coral Cove Water Park, and organizing the details for the Annual Duck Race, to name a few. The Foundation was a sponsor at the Tree Lighting Extravaganza last week. The annual appeal was mailed to vendors in November; we have received \$4,000 so far. A mailing was sent to our Active Agers participants asking if they would consider making a Qualified Charitable Donation (QCD) from their IRAs; we received \$500 so far. At the Adult Trip Preview event, the Foundation conducted a Cork Pull Fundraiser 								

	<p>using the liquor donated for the Putt & Pour, which was cancelled; we brought in \$360.</p> <p>B. WDSRA Update Executive Director Dan Leahy provided an update on WDSRA (see attached). The annual Bash is coming up on March 7, and the Golf Outing in the summer. He is grateful for our participation and support of those fundraisers. Commissioner Bird asked how the Endowment is used. Leahy said it is a scholarship fund.</p> <p>C. Athletics Report Division Manager Kenny, and Recreation Supervisors Richter and Tiscareño, provided an update on Athletic programs (see attached). Kenny oversees the Affiliate programs, gym, and field rentals. Richter oversees baseball, basketball, flag football, floor hockey, t-ball, and summer sports camps. Tiscareño oversees kickball, dodgeball, pickleball, soccer, travel baseball and softball, volleyball, GBN camps, open gym, and Supervisors on Duty. Commissioner Jeffery likes the idea of expanding training for volunteer coaches. Commissioner Bird thinks Volunteer Appreciation posts are a great way to recognize our volunteers. Commissioner Witteck asked what the ratio is for resident/non-resident participation. Kenny said it is approximately 80% for our athletic programs, and 50% for the affiliate programs.</p> <p>D. Simkus Recreation Center Gym Update Executive Director Rini announced the Simkus Gym Floor has been completed. We held a ribbon cutting ceremony that will be posted on Facebook. Final steps include running electric for the new fans, and some minor repairs to exit lights. We are also meeting with Mechanical Engineers from White & Co. to kick off the HVAC system evaluation for the entire building. It is expected to be completed by June 2026. Commissioner Powers is concerned about using White & Co. Executive Director Rini said the Mechanical Engineering Division at White was recommended by PDRMA and many other park districts.</p> <p>E. Upgrading the financial software will improve staff efficiency and support the long term needs of staff, while maintaining efficiency in operational spending. The new software will be up and running by the end of the first quarter. Commissioner Bird asked how much the old third party software costs. Director Scumaci said “When to Work” is \$4,500 per year and keeps going up, and “Time Pro” is \$3,000 per year but is no longer supported by its developer.</p> <p>Commissioner Pauling made a motion to approve a payment not to exceed \$45,234 to Tyler Technologies, Lubbock, TX, for the purchase of a Human Resources Information System Module (HRIS), and Time & Attendance Software as an upgrade to its current Financial Software system. 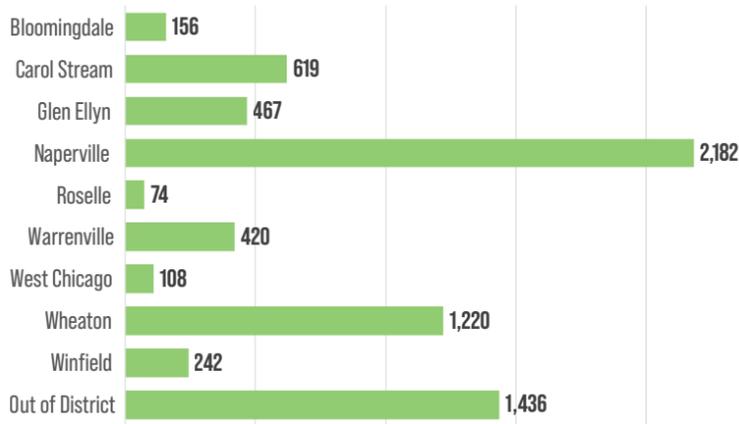

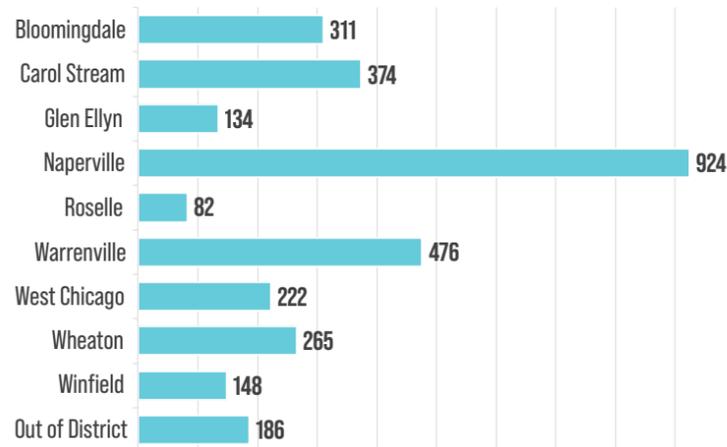

Issue

Should the Board approve the Goals, Organizational Chart, and Wage Scales in conjunction with the 2026 Budget approval process.

Background/Reasoning

This is an annual process for documenting the Board's approval of the Organizational Chart, Goals, and Wage Scales.

Supporting Documents

Excerpts of the Proposed 2026 Budget which reflect these documents are attached for reference.

Public/Customer Impact

Reinforces District's commitment to transparency and alignment of goals.

Recommendation (Roll Call)

That the Board approve the Goals, Organizational Chart, and Wage Scales in conjunction with the 2026 Budget approval process.

These Organizational Goals align with the District Strategic Plan and were first presented to the Board at the November 10 Board Meeting. With Board's feedback to incorporate the exploration of AI Technology to a high priority initiative, the following Organizational Goals have been established for 2026:

- Distinguish CSPD as a community leader.
- Explore options for lighted fields and artificial turf.
- Seek grant opportunities to offset expenses for operating or capital expenses.
- Review Park District Staffing Levels.
- Create a comprehensive IT Replacement Plan to maximize efficiency.
- Develop a structured Communication Plan to effectively engage external partners, customers, and stakeholders.
- Complete Appomattox Park renovation to deliver an updated play environment to our community.
- Complete renovation of Armstrong Park ball fields and hub.
- Evaluate Safety Needs at all Park District Facilities.
- Explore use and applications of AI Technology.

Administration

- Distinguish CSPD as a community leader.
 - Strengthen partnerships with local governments.
 - Explore opportunities for new or expanded partnerships that provide for connection amongst all ages, abilities and cultures.
- Explore options for lighted fields and artificial turf.
 - Use creative methods for funding including grants and partnerships.
- Evaluate acquisition of Papoose Park from Village of Carol Stream.

Finance

- Remain Financially Sustainable
 - Work with District's bank to maximize investments and interest earnings.
 - Provide financial funding recommendations for the implementation of the Capital Improvement Plan.
- Use of operational repair and replacement, or capital funds.
 - Seek grant opportunities to offset expenses for operating or capital expenses.
- Consider non-traditional grant and funding opportunities.

Human Resources & Administrative Services

- Review Park District Staffing Levels.
 - Explore consultants and tools that can assess current staffing levels and make recommendations.
- Successfully implement a new HRIS module to ERP Pro 9 financial software. Improve reports, application tracking, paperwork processing, scheduling and time and attendance features.
 - Eliminate duplicate systems and reduce operating costs.
- Create Staff Retention Program/Plan.
 - Assess success of current staff recognition programs and activities to identify opportunities for improvement.
 - Develop new initiatives to increase staff retention and satisfaction and promote a healthy, positive work environment.
- Provide staff training and development to support growth, succession planning, and retention.

Information Technology

- Create a comprehensive IT Replacement Plan to maximize efficiency.
 - Update network and workstation inventories.
 - Update peripheral inventories, including monitors, laser printers, receipt printers, data card printers, workstation cameras, keyboards, etc.
 - Determine items and quantity that should be in stock for critical replacements.
- Inventory all software systems.
 - Include software lifespan and upgrade needs.
 - Include maintenance schedules and any amenities to be suggested to improve efficiency.
- Complete Windows 11 hardware conversion by early 2027.

Marketing

- Develop a structured Communication Plan to effectively engage external partners, customers, and stakeholders.
- Assess and determine social media platforms, electronic communications.
 - Evaluation of benefit of unique pages.
 - Assess types of Platforms.
- Expand marketing and outreach to connect with non-users and bring users to facilities, and address language barriers.

Parks & Facilities

- Evaluate renovation and improvement needs for Simkus Recreation Center.
 - Design an upgraded HVAC System
- Create a safety program specific to tasks and duties of the Facility staff.
 - Example: roof inspection training
- Explore conversion of three landscape areas at the FVRC Entrance into community-based art installations.
 - Complete renovation of Appomattox Park to deliver an updated play environment to our community.
 - Complete renovation of Armstrong Park ball fields and hub.
- Increase quality of Park District athletic fields.
- Create a monthly blog for Parks & Facilities that reaches the public describing what the department accomplishes.
- Create community outreach boards at strategic locations throughout park system
 - Help to distinguish the District as a community leader.
- Utilize technology throughout Parks & Facilities for internal playground and facility inspections to maximize efficiency.

Recreation

- Elevate the overall quality of programs and special events by integrating emerging trends and/or updating current operations and analyzing competitors.
- Expand access to programming and facilities in the underserved areas of the community.
- Expand professional development opportunities to facilitate long-term succession plans and to support staff retention.
- Enhance training and development for part-time staff and volunteer coaches.

Risk Management

- Evaluate Safety Needs at all Park District Facilities.
 - Conduct assessments of each facility and create a master plan that includes a suggested budget and timeline.
- Develop a comprehensive safety training plan and annual training calendar.

Full-Time Staff Wage Scale

The District conducted a Compensation Study in 2024 through the same agency who prepared the 2018 study. Using factors such as geographic location, population served, operating budget, and comparisons to other Park Districts with similar parameters, a wage scale is created. For the positions that crossover into the private sector, the scale blends a percentage of data from that market as well.

In order to remain competitive in the current market and retain high quality staff, the scale is adjusted annually by 1-2% less than the proposed merit pool. This year the scale was adjusted by 2.5% (or 1.5% less than the 4.0% merit percentage).

Minimum Wage and Part-Time Wage Scale

The Part-Time Staff Wage Scale saw significant yearly adjustments due to Illinois minimum hourly wage increases that started in 2020 with an increase from \$8.25 to \$10.00, and ended in January of 2025 at \$15.00/hour. This is the first year since 2020 where the Part-Time Wage Scale was not adjusted due to a \$1/hour required increase to the hourly rate. To compete with private sector employers, the District sets a \$16/hour minimum for individuals age 18 and over, and \$15/hour for those ages 16-17.

Below are the updated 2026 Wage Scales; one for Full-Time Staff, and one for Part-Time Staff. **The Board will be asked to approve the District's Wage Scales in conjunction with the Proposed Budget for 2026.**

The Kailasha Development at Kuhn and Lies Road continues to move through its approval process with the Village of Carol Stream. All amenities of the development will remain within the boundaries of the Kailasha owned property.

As previously shared with the Board, Kailasha requested permission to remove the scrub and invasive plantings/shrubs along the east side of Jan Smith Park; they proposed replacing them with several trees to improve the aesthetics of the park (and the view for the new homeowners). Kailasha provided a certificate of insurance that named the Park District as additionally insured as part of that request.

Kailasha recently shared the attached proposed tree installation plan; it includes approximately 12 trees. As per Village regulations, Kailasha must cover a 3-year warranty on the trees to ensure they are fully established before they ‘turn them over’ to the Park District. We’ve asked their attorney to put this into a letter of agreement to document the conditions.

Additionally, Kailasha has offered to donate a Memorial Tree (and memorial stone) to the site in honor of the Hahn Farm. We are still discussing this option.

Staff believe the proposed tree plan will be a positive improvement to the area, and we are open to hearing any comments the Board may have.

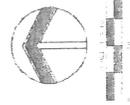

Discussion: Special Recreation Inclusion Task Force Update

Agenda Item #: 7D

The Special Recreation Inclusion Task Force continues progress on addressing the rising costs of inclusion services. We identified several areas for review.

- **Frequency and detailed back-up of billing has been addressed.** We will continue to provide feedback to WDSRA for additional details that assist in reconciliation of monthly billing.
- **A solution for billing of inclusion services for non-residents has been agreed upon.** WDSRA is setting up a process for inclusion services to be billed to a participant's home park district instead of the district providing the program. This will allow the district collecting tax dollars for an individual receiving services to be the one paying the inclusion costs. In Carol Stream, 24% of the participants receiving inclusion services were non-residents; that would have represented over \$43,000 in 2025. A new method for billing will be implemented within the next few months.
- **Protocols for determining Inclusion Services** are still a work in progress.
 - Park District and WDSRA Staff met just prior to the holidays to review the process for inclusion services, improve communication between agencies, and discuss options to reduce inclusion assignments.
 - Increased communication with parents about child's need, exhibited behaviors, and tools available before an aide is assigned.
 - Increased training of District front line staff and supervisory staff who utilize inclusion services for their programs.
 - Carol Stream will serve as a pilot agency for additional, targeted training of park district staff (especially camp counselors) to reduce the number of WDSRA Aides.
 - Ratios are being reviewed; can we add additional park camp counselors in lieu of an inclusion aid?
 - Can inclusion aids be shared by participants?
 - Possible inclusion coordinator on site to support and/or reduce the number of inclusion aids.
- **WDSRA Staffing Protocols** (employment practices for payment of staff) is still on the Task Force agenda for further discussion. The next meeting will be held on January 15th.

Discussion: ADA Updates

In August of 2018 the Park District adopted a formal ADA Transition Plan. The approved plan placed the District on a clear path towards providing equal and integrated access to all its services, facilities, programs and activities. While the law states, at a minimum, we must “make reasonable modifications to policies and procedures as well as physical changes to the built environment,” it is clear the Carol Stream Park District goes over and above the minimum required standards as we pride ourselves on being the agency, “Where Everyone Is Welcome.”

As we embark on any park/playground renovation or a building modification, the first thing we do as a team is pull out the ADA Transition Plan and make sure we identify areas that are deficient on that particular park site or building and, through each specific project, address those deficiencies through the planning process. This detailed process shines a light on individuals with disabilities, how they potentially navigate our parks, playgrounds and facilities and reminds us to remove the obstacles they may find challenging so each and every human being we invite into our District can have the same recreational experience regardless of ability.

Below is a detailed list of the larger scale projects but please be aware there are other routine tasks such as monitoring the pressure it takes to open a door, the tension on stall door springs, etc. that are also being observed by staff weekly and monthly to also ensure we are providing an incredibly positive experience for every single visitor that chooses to visit the Carol Stream Park District.

Most Recent Update

- **Communication Boards** – each year through the budget process the Marketing Team works with the Parks Department to come up with new locations for our site-specific communication boards. The boards are budgeted, created and installed. In 2025, communication boards were installed at Community Park (2), Armstrong Park, and McCaslin Park adjacent to the playground by the parking lot. The intent is to install one at every location throughout the Park District in the coming year.
- **Raised Garden Plots** – while renovating Community Park, the District installed raised garden plots for easier access while gardening. They were specifically designed so every inch could be reached if an individual was using a mobility device such as a wheelchair. Additionally, the Park District donated two raised garden plots to WDSRA so they could utilize them for their day program and teach their participants a life skill in caring for a garden.

- **Community Park Trail System** – conscious decisions were made throughout the planning process to increase connectivity and reduce various grades throughout the trail system to ensure all trails were accessible and compliant.
- **Superman Swings (Oodle Swings)** – an Oodle Swing, aka “superman swing,” was installed in the play space adjacent to the sand volleyball courts at Armstrong Park and one at Pleasant Hill Park. You may be asking yourself, “how is a large piece of plastic equivalent to a tire swing accessible?” Great question! The reason these swings are critical in a play environment is because we are forcing a relationship. A relationship between a mom and son, friend to friend, etc. An individual that utilizes a mobility device is forced to leave their mobility device, be placed on the swing and then, in turn, needs assistance getting this particular swing in motion as it can’t be done alone. We have now put a typically developing person in contact with someone who has a disability, requiring them to help each other recreate! This is a very intentional thought process and, if you spend any time at one of these playgrounds, it works!

Once again, we continue to look at each and every project from the lens of an individual with a disability, guided by the approved ADA Transition Plan. More importantly, we look at all projects as open-minded human beings who simply want to provide meaningful, thoughtful recreation to every single person that steps foot into one of our spaces regardless of ability. Everyone is welcome!

Issue:

Should the Board adopt Ordinance No. 595, 2026 Budget and Appropriation Ordinance in the total amount of \$19,209,347 for the fiscal year January 1, 2026 to December 31, 2026.

Background/Reasoning

- A Budget and Appropriation Ordinance outlines the District’s plans for expenditures. It differs from the Levy Ordinance which outlines the acquisition of tax revenues and how they are distributed.
- Last September the staff began the budget process for the 2026 fiscal year.
- As required under state statute:
 - The Board must annually adopt a Budget and Appropriation Ordinance.
 - Staff placed the Budget and Appropriation Ordinance on public display on December 8, 2025 to fulfill the 30 day requirement.
 - A notice of a Public Hearing for the Budget and Appropriation Ordinance appeared in the Daily Herald on December 30, 2025.
 - This evening the Board will hold a Public Hearing to hear any public comments.
- The Ordinance meets all the requirements of the Park District Code Article 4.4 “Adoption of Budget and Passage of Annual Appropriation Ordinance Required.”
- The ‘Budget’ column (Page 3 of Ordinance) reflects the budget dollars as presented to the Board in the Budget 2026 document.
- The ‘Appropriation’ column (Page 3 of Ordinance) reflects a 15% increase to the budgeted dollars to:
 - provide a contingency margin to better manage ordinary operating expenses
 - allow the park district some flexibility in generating more revenue that will offset additional expenses, and
 - eliminate the need to come back to the Board to request approval of minor amendments to the budget.

Ordinance No. No. 595

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A COMBINED ANNUAL BUDGET AND APPROPRIATING SUCH SUMS OF MONEY AS MAY BE DEEMED NECESSARY TO DEFRAY ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CAROL STREAM PARK DISTRICT, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2026, AND ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2026, AND SPECIFYING THE OBJECTS AND PURPOSES FOR WHICH SUCH APPROPRIATIONS ARE MADE, AND THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED FOR EACH OBJECT AND PURPOSE.

WHEREAS, the Board of Park Commissioners of the Carol Stream Park District has caused this Ordinance to be prepared in tentative form as the combined annual budget and appropriation ordinance for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2026, and ending December 31, 2026, and the Secretary of the Board has made same conveniently available for public inspection for at least thirty (30) days prior to final action thereon; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held as to such combined annual budget and appropriation ordinance at the Carol Stream Park District on the 12th day of January, 2026, pursuant to a notice which was published in the Daily Herald, a paper having a general circulation in this district, and all other legal requirements having been complied with.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS OF THE CAROL STREAM PARK DISTRICT, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

Section I: This Ordinance is hereby termed THE ANNUAL COMBINED BUDGET AND APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE OF THE CAROL STREAM PARK DISTRICT, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS

Section II: That the estimates of current assets shown in the appended statements are made a part hereof and marked "Exhibit A" of this ordinance of the Carol Stream Park District, DuPage County, Illinois, for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2026, and ending December 31, 2026. As part of the Annual Budget, it is stated:

- (a) That the estimated cash on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year is \$9,024,567
- (b) That the cash expected to be received during the fiscal year from all sources is \$18,112,323
- (c) That the estimated expenditures contemplated for the fiscal year are \$19,209,347

- (d) That the estimated cash expected to be on hand at the end of the fiscal year is \$7,927,544.
- (e) That the estimated amount of taxes to be received by the Carol Stream Park District during the fiscal year is \$11,491,809.

Section III: The amounts hereinafter set forth and appended hereto and marked "Exhibit B" are hereby budgeted and appropriated for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2026 and ending December 31, 2026. The sums of money in the "Appropriation" Column in the amount of or as much thereof as may be authorized by law and the same are hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes of the Carol Stream Park District as therein after specified for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2026 and ending December 31, 2026.

Section IV: That all unexpected balances of any item or items or any general appropriations made in this ordinance be expended in making up any insufficiency in any item or items in the same general appropriations made for this ordinance.

Section V: That all unexpected balances from annual appropriations of previous years are hereby re-appropriated.

Section VI: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section VII: If any item, or portion thereof, of this ordinance is held invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of such item or the remaining portion of this ordinance.

Section VIII: The passage by the Board of Commissioners of the Carol Stream Park District of this 2026 Combined Annual Budget Appropriation Ordinance, including the "Appropriation" column, shall not be interpreted to authorize the expenditure within any fund of any amount greater than the amount budgeted for each fund in the "Budget" column.

Section IX: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication in the manner provided by law. A certified copy of this ordinance shall be filed with the County Clerk of DuPage County, Illinois, together with the certificate of the Chief Fiscal Officer of the Park District within thirty (30) days after its passage and approval as provided by law.

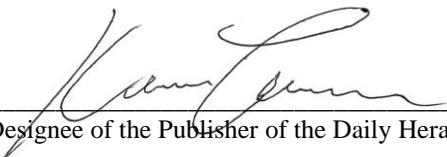

Issue:

Should the Board make a motion to extend the current agreement for two additional years for Mowing Services with Sweet Home Landscaping, Elgin, IL totaling \$223,329.75 annually for the mowing seasons in 2027 and 2028.

Background/Reasoning

- Staff is thoroughly satisfied with the quality of service provided by Sweet Home Landscaping through the first two years of the agreement.
- Sweet Home's pricing structure is advantageous to the Park District.
- The amount of maintenance calls staff receives from residents have evaporated and, in two years, our unsatisfactory communications can be counted on one hand.
- Staff would like to lock Sweet Home Landscaping in for two additional years now so Sweet Home Landscaping does not secure new work to fill the void of potentially losing this contract with the District.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

Mowing & Landscaping Services

1. INTENT

The Carol Stream Park District desires to enter into agreement with a single contractor to provide Mowing & Landscaping Services for all District properties. The contract includes mowing, weed whipping, and trash removal at all properties listed on “Exhibit B” as well as weeding the Simkus Recreation Center, Fountain View Recreation Center, Coral Cove Water Park and Coyote Crossing Mini Gold every other week.

2. SCOPE OF WORK

The Contractor shall be responsible for all services required herein to be performed, and shall provide and furnish all labor, materials, necessary tools, expendable equipment and supplies, vehicles and transportation services required to perform and complete the Mowing & Landscaping Services from defined areas within “Exhibit B.”

Contractor is responsible for any and all damage to any properties, which are a result of Contractor's actions. Contractor shall repair or replace any and all property damaged due to Contractor's work.

All work shall be performed by experienced personnel directly employed by the Contractor.

The Contractor shall provide management and technical supervision through competent supervisors as required to implement the required contract.

Contractor shall be responsible for the skills, methods, and actions of Contractor's employees and for all work.

Contractor shall employ a sufficient number of staff to ensure performance of the work described (minimum 4 employees).

3. FINAL CONTRACT

The term of this original contract will be for 3 mowing seasons. Work shall commence on, or around, April 1, 2024 and be completed by November 30, 2026 at the latest; **the Park District may extend the terms of this contract for up to two additional extensions of 2 years each based upon work performance. If an extension is mutually agreed upon and approved by the District Board it will include a 3% increase at the time of each extension. This means, the contract will go up 3% for the first two year extension and subsequently an additional 3% after the second two year extension.**

4. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS, ORDINANCES AND REGULATIONS

The Contractor shall comply with all applicable Federal, State and Local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations during the term of this contract. The Park District has determined that the Mowing & Landscaping Services that are the subject of this Contract are NOT within the scope of the Prevailing Wage Act. Contractor shall be held responsible for the preservation and protection of all public and private property. Should any direct or indirect damage or injury result to any public or private property or to any persons encountered in the course of work on account of any act, omission, neglect, or misconduct in the execution of the work, or as a consequence of non-execution thereof on the part of the Contractor or any of their employees or agent, such property or person shall be restored and made whole at the expense of the contractor.

5. STANDARDS OF PERFORMANCE/WORKMANSHIP

All other portions of these special provisions notwithstanding, it is the intent of these special provisions that, at a minimum, the Contractor adheres to mowing specifications, attached as "Exhibit A". The Director of Parks & Facilities and/or the Parks Manager shall be the sole judge as to the adequacy of the work.

6. SUBMITTALS AND INSPECTIONS

1. The Park District will conduct regular inspections of Contractor's work.
2. Contractor shall provide the Park District the following reports:
 - a) Report of any damage done to private or public property while conducting Mowing & Landscaping Services.
 - b) All invoices must be submitted electronically to the Director on, or around, the 15th of every month.

7. MEETINGS

Upon award of the contract and before initial start of work, the Contractor shall contact the Director of Parks & Facilities at shaneh@csparks.org and the Parks Manager at randya@csparks.org to schedule a pre-season meeting. Additionally, a meeting will be scheduled every month in the mowing season: May, June, July, August, September, October and November. A day/time will be scheduled once contract is awarded. Contractor shall meet with the Park District as necessary afterwards to review the status of mowing.

8. VEHICLES AND EQUIPMENT

The Park District reserves the right to request descriptive literature or specification sheets for each type of vehicle or equipment listed as it deems necessary to properly administer specifications of the contract. Upon request of the Park District, the Contractor shall demonstrate the equipment is suitable for the proposed services.

All vehicles and equipment shall be maintained in good working order and appearance, free of rust, and shall be clean at the start of each working day. No vehicle or equipment shall be

operated on Park District property that leaks any fluids from the engine or working mechanism. In the event that any vehicle or equipment is not properly operable, a substitute vehicle shall immediately be provided that complies with the terms herein. All vehicles shall display the name of the Contractor, a local phone number, and a vehicle identification number that is clearly visible on both sides.

9. TAXES, LICENSES, PERMITS AND CERTIFICATES

By law, the Park District is exempt from paying Federal Excise Tax, State and Local Retailer's Occupation Tax, State and Local Service Occupation Tax and Service Use Tax.

The Contractor shall secure, at its own expense, all necessary, licenses and certificates of authority required to complete the work, and shall comply with all requirements of such, licenses and certificates of authority to operate. The Contractor shall keep and maintain all such licenses, and certificates of authority in full force and effect throughout the term of this contract.

10. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

Contractor shall comply with the Illinois Human Rights Act, 775 ILCS 5/1-101 et seq., as amended, and any rules and regulations promulgated in accordance therewith, including, but not limited to the Equal Employment Opportunity Clause, Illinois Administrative Code, Title 44, Part 750 (Appendix A), which is incorporated herein by reference. Contractor shall ensure that any permitted subcontractor shall include said Equal Employment Opportunity Clause in each of its subcontracts.

Furthermore, the Contractor shall comply with the Public Works Employment Discrimination Act, 775 ILCS 10/0.01 et seq., as amended.

11. NON-ASSIGNMENT

The Contractor shall not assign or subcontract this contract or the work hereunder, or any part thereof, to any other person, firm or corporation without prior written consent of the Park District.

12. SAFETY, ACCIDENT PREVENTION AND NOTIFICATION

The Contractor shall be responsible for initiation, maintaining, and supervising all safety precautions and programs in connection with the work of this contract. Precaution shall be exercised at all times for the protection of persons and property. The safety provisions of all applicable laws, regulations and building codes shall be observed, including safeguards on machinery and equipment, the elimination of hazards, and worker safety training.

In the event of accidents of any kind that involve the general public and/or private or public property, the Contractor shall immediately notify the Park District. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide such accounting of details and/or copy of written accident reports.

Safety & Warning Signs / Cones for work zones to be Contractors responsibility and shall meet all Park District Standards. Work Hours shall be per The Village of Carol Stream and Park District Ordinances.

13. ADDITIONAL WORK REQUIREMENTS

A. JOB SITE DAILY CLEANUP

Contractor shall pick up and dispose of trash throughout the mowable acreage.

Contractor shall not mow over trash. If contractor is not adhering to this particular clause of the contract the Director of Parks & Facilities will deduct \$250 from the weekly contractual amount. (Picture evidence will be provided to contractor at time of deduct.) A warning will be sent on the first occurrence. The second occurrence will result in a \$250 credit to the monthly invoice. This amount will not exceed \$1000 in a given month and will only be credited with photo evidence.

B. EQUIPMENT STORAGE / PARKING

The Contractor shall not place any equipment or materials throughout the Park District without prior approval by the Park District. All staging locations for equipment and materials must be pre-approved by the Park District. Contractor and subcontractors are responsible for the security of their own materials, tools and equipment at the site and the Park District shall not be liable for any loss or damage that may occur thereto.

14. DAMAGE

The Contractor shall take all necessary precautions for the protection of public or private property. The Contractor shall be responsible for damages on, or to, public or private property resulting from careless or negligent operation of vehicles or handling of any receptacle. All property which suffers damage (reasonable wear-and-tear excepted) caused by the Contractor shall be repaired or replaced as soon as possible to equivalent quality at the time of the damage, and at no extra charge to the property owner. If the Contractor fails to do so within a reasonable period of time, the Park District may, after the expiration of a period of forty-eight (48) hours after giving the Contractor notice in writing, proceed to repair or replace such property as may be deemed necessary at the Contractor's expense. Contractor agrees to pay for said expenses within ten (10) days of receipt of said invoice.

15. EMPLOYEES AND CONDUCT

The Contractor shall undertake to perform all Mowing & Landscaping Services rendered hereunder in a neat, orderly and efficient manner; to use care and diligence in the performance of this contract; and to provide courteous and knowledgeable personnel in its customer service office.

16. NON-PERFORMANCE OF SERVICE

If the Contractor fails to observe the established schedule of service and/or fails to meet the 'Standards of Performance/Workmanship mentioned in Paragraph 5 of this document for more than two (2) consecutive working days, the Park District reserves the right to determine if there has been sufficient cause to justify non-observance of the service schedule. If, in the Park District's judgment, sufficient cause has not been demonstrated, then the Park District shall serve notice either personally or by affixing such notice to the premises of the servicing location of the Contractor stating that this contract shall be deemed in default if the Contractor does not take action to re-establish the schedule within twenty-four (24) hours of said notice. If at the

end of the twenty-four (24) hour period the Contractor has not taken corrective action, the Park District shall take such steps as are necessary to furnish services according to the collection requirements provided for in this contract. The Contractor shall be liable for any costs incurred by the Park District to correct such default. Notwithstanding or foregoing, the Park District shall further reserve the right to terminate this contract.

17. SERVICE LOCATIONS AND POINTS OF CONTACT

The Contractor shall establish and maintain an office through which it may be contacted directly, where Park District personnel may telephone or send inquires and complaints, and where the Park District personnel may send and receive instruction. The office shall be equipped with sufficient telephones, and shall have a responsible person in charge during normal business hours.

The contractor shall also notify the Park District of its designated contact person(s) for the purposes of obtaining instruction, answering inquires and resolving complaints. Such person(s) shall be available to discuss, and if necessary, meet with Park District personnel to resolve problems.

18. NOTIFICATIONS

Official notifications, whenever required for any purpose under contract, shall be made in writing and addressed to the Park District as follows:

19. RIGHT TO REQUIRE PERFORMANCE

The failure of the Park District at any time to require performance by the Contractor of any specifications in this contract shall in no way affect the right of the Park District hereafter to enforce same. Nor shall waiver by the Park District of any breach of specifications in this contract be taken or held to be waiver of any succeeding breach of such specifications in this contract, nor be taken or held to be waiver of any specification itself.

20. CHANGE IN SERVICE; AMENDMENTS

If the Park District should wish to change the type of service provided during the term of this contract, including, but not limited to, service specifications or modifications and/or response times the Park District shall have the option to initiate the change in service by serving written notice to the Contractor at its designated place of business at least ten (10) days prior to the date such service change is contemplated to begin. Both parties agree to negotiate the terms, frequency, and prices of such change in service after such written notice is served. Such modifications shall be contained in written agreement executed by the parties.

“EXHIBIT A”

Mowing & Landscaping Services Specifications

DESCRIPTION

The Parks & Facilities Department is responsible for all Mowing & Landscaping Services throughout the Park District. The Carol Stream Park District desires to enter into an agreement with a single contractor to provide Mowing & Landscaping Services to help support our Turf Management Program. The contract includes mowing, weed whipping and trash removal at all District properties located on “Exhibit A” as well as weeding the Simkus Recreation Center, Coral Cove Water Park, Coyote Crossing Mini Gold, Veteran’s Memorial Park and Fountain View Recreation Center every other week. The Park District reserves the right to add or decrease the mowable acres based on the proposer’s unit prices.

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS

All contractors MUST meet the following minimum requirements to be considered for work:

- Minimum of 5 years’ experience providing Mowing & Landscaping Services. If less than five years experience, previous experience with the Park District will be considered.
- Provide adequate communications (Office or Cell Phone).
- Ability to provide competent drivers/ operators that are capable of efficiently operating the equipment assigned and are able to read Park District supplied maps.
- Provide equipment that meets or exceeds the Department of Parks & Facilities equipment specifications. All equipment shall display the name of the contractor for identification.
- Meet or exceed all Liability Insurance Requirements as required by the Park District.

SUPPLEMENTS TO STANDARD SPECIFICATIONS

Before submitting proposals, bidders should visit the site of the proposed work, verify all site conditions and also conditions under which said work must be conducted.

Submission of a Proposal implies that the bidder is fully conversant with all requirements of Minimum Requirements, Standard Specifications, Special Provisions, Standard Drawings, and site conditions. No claim for additional compensation will be considered or paid because of the CONTRACTOR’S negligence or failure to be so informed.

MOWING & LANDSCAPING SERVICES SPECIFICATIONS

The CONTRACTOR shall perform and provide:

- It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to mow all items on “Exhibit A” **once a week** unless otherwise noted on “Exhibit A.”
- Weed whipping around all stationary structures within mowable acreage including, but not limited to: bleachers, fences, fence posts, trees, athletic equipment, sidewalks in front of parks on parkway, etc. **SPRAYING WEED KILLER AROUND STATIONARY STRUCTURES IS NOT ACCEPTABLE. IF DONE WITHOUT DISTRICT PERMISSION CONTRACTOR WILL RESTORE AFFECTED AREAS WITH TOPSOIL AND SEED IMMEDIATELY UPON REQUEST.**
- Orient each mower in such a manner as to never blow grass clippings into any body of water, or wetland/natural area, while mowing.
- Trash pickup while mowing all items on “Exhibit A.” **NO MOWING OVER TRASH.**
- Grass clippings shall be removed where grass clippings are not spread evenly over the area. Bid price shall include disposal when necessary, following all applicable laws and all costs associated. Grass clippings shall be removed immediately off of adjacent sidewalks and pavement.
- Provide the minimum manpower to complete Mowing & Landscaping Services on a weekly basis.
- Mowing & Landscaping Services may be stopped due to weather conditions by the Director of Parks & Facilities or the Parks Manager. In such an event, the contractor will not receive payment for acres not mowed. In short, no mowing equals no payment.
- **Trimming (weed whipping)** shall be done weekly. All areas will be trimmed at the time of each mowing to give grounds a professional appearance. Trimming around trees, shrubs, cultivated areas, beds, fences, poles, walls, valves, sidewalks, paths and other similar objects shall match the height and appearance of surrounding vegetation. Adjoining sidewalks and other pavement shall be cleaned of debris. Trimming around woody plants shall be done in such a manner so no bark damage occurs from mowers, string-trimmers or other tools. Contractor shall be responsible for repair or replacement (at the Carol Stream Park District’s option) of planting material or other property damaged as a result of contractor’s operations under this agreement.
- **Clean Ups** shall be done once per year at every facility in April/May (weather permitting). Clean-ups include: weeding, trimming/pruning all shrubs, bushes, generally speaking all plant life and trash picked up. Completed no later than May 31.

- **INSPECTIONS:** The Contractor shall be prepared for onsite inspections of all work on a weekly basis.
- **SUBMITTALS:** The Contractor shall:
 - a. Submit a monthly performance report with each monthly invoice documenting all work completed the previous month. Report should be emailed by to Shane Hamilton (shaneh@csparks.org) and Randy Anderson (randya@csparks.org).
 - b. Invoices – the contract is based on 30 weeks of service. If agreeable with contractor, the District divides the contractual total by 7 (approximately 7 months of mowing) and pays the contractor 1/7th of the contractual total in May, June, July, August, September, October and November.

BASE PROPOSAL/ FEE SCHEDULE

The contractor shall provide all necessary labor, tools, implements, equipment, materials, and supplies to complete the contracted work.

Should there be a discrepancy between the gross sum bid amount and the bid amount calculated from the summation of quantities multiplied by their respective unit prices, the latter shall apply.

The quantities stated in these bid documents for which unit prices are to be provided are approximate only and is intended for the purposes of obtaining a gross sum, computing the value of additions and deductions, and determining the lowest responsible Proposer. Compensation to the Contractor shall be based upon the actual quantities used for the performance of the Work multiplied by the unit price stated in Contractor's Fee Schedule for each item. Payment will be based on mowable acreage at the accepted unit price.

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

Contractor shall obtain insurance of the types and in the amounts listed below.

A. **Commercial General and Umbrella Liability Insurance**

Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability (CGL) and, if necessary, commercial umbrella insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence. If such CGL insurance contains a general aggregate limit, it shall apply separately to this project/location.

CGL insurance shall be written on Insurance Services Office (ISO) occurrence form CG 00 01 10 93, or a substitute form providing equivalent coverage, and shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, independent contractors, products-completed operations, personal injury and advertising injury, and liability assumed under an insured contract (including the tort liability of another assumed in a business contract).

Owner shall be included as an insured under the CGL, using ISO additional insured endorsement CG 20 10 or a substitute providing equivalent coverage, and under the commercial umbrella, if any. This insurance shall apply as primary insurance with respect to any other insurance or self-insurance afforded to Owner. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by Owner shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

There shall be no endorsement or modification of the CGL limiting the scope of coverage for liability arising from pollution, explosion, collapse, or underground property damage.

B. **Continuing Completed Operations Liability Insurance**

Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability (CGL) and, if necessary, commercial umbrella liability insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for at least three years following substantial completion of the work.

Continuing CGL insurance shall be written on ISO occurrence form CG 00 01 10 93, or substitute form providing equivalent coverage, and shall, at minimum, cover liability arising from products completed operations and liability assumed under an insured contract.

Continuing CGL insurance shall have a products-completed operations aggregate of at least two times its each occurrence limit.

Continuing commercial umbrella coverage, if any, shall include liability coverage for damage to the insured's completed work equivalent to that provided under ISO form CG 00 01.

C. **Business Auto and Umbrella Liability Insurance**

Contractor shall maintain business auto liability and, if necessary, commercial umbrella liability insurance with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident. Such insurance shall cover liability arising out of any auto including owned, hired and non-owned autos.

Business auto insurance shall be written on Insurance Services Office (ISO) form CA 00 01, CA 00 05, CA 00 12, CA 00 20, or a substitute form providing equivalent liability coverage. If necessary, the policy shall be endorsed to provide contractual liability coverage equivalent to that provided in the 1990 and later editions of CA 00 01.

D. Workers Compensation Insurance

Contractor shall maintain workers compensation as required by statute and employers liability insurance. The commercial umbrella and/or employers liability limits shall not be less than \$1,000,000 each accident for bodily injury by accident or \$1,000,000 each employee for bodily injury by disease.

If Owner has not been included as an insured under the CGL using ISO additional insured endorsement CG 20 10 under the Commercial General and Umbrella Liability Insurance required in this Contract, the Contractor waives all rights against Owner and its officers, officials, employees, volunteers and agents for recovery of damages arising out of or incident to the Contractor's work.

E. General Insurance Provisions

1. Evidence of Insurance

Prior to beginning work, Contractor shall furnish Owner with a certificate(s) of insurance and applicable policy endorsement(s), executed by a duly authorized representative of each insurer, showing compliance with the insurance requirements set forth above.

All certificates shall provide for 30 days written notice to Owner prior to the cancellation or material change of any insurance referred to therein. Written notice to Owner shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested.

Failure of Owner to demand such certificate, endorsement or other evidence of full compliance with these insurance requirements or failure of Owner to identify a deficiency from evidence that is provided shall not be construed as a waiver of Contractor's obligation to maintain such insurance.

Owner shall have the right, but not the obligation, of prohibiting Contractor or any subcontractor from entering the project site until such certificates or other evidence that insurance has been placed in complete compliance with these requirements is received and approved by Owner.

Failure to maintain the required insurance may result in termination of this Contract at Owner's option.

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

With respect to insurance maintained after final payment in compliance with a requirement above, an additional certificate(s) evidencing such coverage shall be promptly provided to Owner whenever requested.

Contractor shall provide certified copies of all insurance policies required above within 10 days of Owners written request for said copies.

2. **Acceptability of Insurers**

For insurance companies which obtain a rating from A.M. Best, that rating should be no less than A VII using the most recent edition of the A.M. Best's Key Rating Guide. If the Best's rating is less than A VII or a Best's rating is not obtained, the Owner has the right to reject insurance written by an insurer it deems unacceptable.

3. **Cross-Liability Coverage**

If Contractor's liability policies do not contain the standard ISO separation of insured's provision, or a substantially similar clause, they shall be endorsed to provide cross-liability coverage.

4. **Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions**

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to the Owner. At the option of the Owner, the Contractor may be asked to eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the Owner, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers and agents or required to procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and other related costs including but not limited to investigations, claim administration and defense expenses.

5. **Subcontractors**

Contractor shall cause each subcontractor employed by Contractor to purchase and maintain insurance of the type specified above. When requested by the Owner, Contractor shall furnish copies of certificates of insurance evidencing coverage for each subcontractor.

F. **Indemnification**

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Carol Stream Park District, the architect, the CSPD board of commissioners, officers, directors, agents, employees, representatives, volunteers and agents from and against all claims, damages, losses and expenses including but not limited to legal fees

(attorney's and paralegals' fees and court costs), arising out of or resulting from the performance of the Contractor's work, provided that any such claim, damage, loss or expense (i) is attributable to bodily injury, sickness, disease or death, or injury to or destruction of tangible property, other than the work itself, including the loss of use resulting there from and (ii) is caused in whole or in part by any wrongful or negligent act or omission of the Contractor, any Subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable. Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge, or otherwise reduce any other right or obligation of indemnity which would otherwise exist as to any party or person described in this Paragraph. Contractor shall similarly protect, indemnify and hold and save harmless the Carol Stream Park District, its officers, officials, employees, volunteers and agents against and from any and all claims, costs, causes, actions and expenses including but not limited to legal fees, incurred by reason of Contractor's breach of any of its obligations under, or Contractor's default of, any provision of the Contract.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with any provision of this Equal Employment Opportunity Clause, the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Act or the Fair Employment Practices Commission's Rules and Regulations for Public Contracts, the contractor may be declared not

responsible and therefore ineligible for future contracts or subcontracts with the State of Illinois or any of its political subdivision or municipal corporations, and the contract may be canceled or avoided in whole or in part, and such other sanctions or penalties may be imposed or remedies involved as provided by statute or regulation.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

1. That it will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin or ancestry; and further that it will examine all job classifications to determine if minority persons or women are underutilized and will take appropriate affirmative action to rectify any such underutilization.
2. That, if it hires additional employees in order to perform this contract, or any portion hereof, it will determine the availability (in accordance with the Commission's Rules and Regulations for Public Contracts) of minorities and women in the area(s) from which it may reasonably recruit and it will hire for each job classification for which employees are hired in such a way that minorities and women are not underutilized.
3. That, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by it or on its behalf, it will state that all applicants will be afforded equal opportunity without discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin or ancestry.
4. That it will send to each labor organization or representative of works with which it has or is bound by collective bargaining or other agreement or understanding, a notice advising such labor organization or representative of the contractor's obligations under the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Act and the commission's Rules and Regulations for Public Contract. If any such labor organization or representative fails or refuses to cooperate with the contractor in its efforts to comply with such Act and Rules and Regulations, the contractor will promptly so notify the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Commission and the contracting agency and will recruit employees from other sources when necessary to fulfill its obligations there under.
5. That it will submit reports as required by the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Commission's Rules and Regulations for Public Contracts, furnish all relevant information as may from time to time be requested by the Commission or the contracting agency, and in all respects comply with the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Act and the Commission's Rules and Regulations for Public Contracts so that

such provisions will be binding upon every such subcontractor; and that it will also so include the provisions of paragraphs 1, 5, 6 and 7 in every supply subcontract as defined in Section 2.10 (a) of the Commission’s Rules and Regulations for Public Contracts so that such provisions will be binding upon every such subcontractor. In the same manners as with other provisions of this contract, the contractor will be liable for compliance with applicable provisions of this clause by all its subcontractors; and further it will promptly notify the contracting agency and the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Commission in the event any subcontractor fails or refuses to comply therewith. In addition, no contractor will utilize any subcontractor declared by the Commission to be not responsible and therefore, ineligible for contracts or subcontracts with the State of Illinois or any of its political subdivisions or municipal corporations.

With respect to the two types of subcontracts referred to under paragraph 7 or the Equal Employment Opportunity Clause above, the following is an excerpt of Section 2 of the FEPC’s Rules and Regulations for Public Contracts:

“Section 2.10. The term “Subcontract” means any agreement, arrangement or understanding, written or otherwise, between a contractor and any person (in which the parties do not stand in the relationship of any employer and an employee):

- (a) for the furnishing of supplies or services or for the use of real or personal property, including lease arrangements, which, in whole or in part, utilized in the performance of any one or more contracts; or
- (b) under which any portion of the contractor’s obligation under any one or more contracts is performed, undertaken or assumed.”
